throughout the twentieth century the question of culture was a central pillar of social scientific

thought today however the concept has disappeared from the academic landscape despite pressing political debates about culture wars identity politics cultural appropriation and nativism the concept of culture is no longer seen as a credible explanatory tool dreams of presence provides a novel theoretical approach to the question of culture and will be of use to geographers anthropologists sociologists and social theorists grappling to understand why culture continues to be a dominant political force in our contemporary world drawing on heidegger levinas derrida and Žižek mitch rose provides an existential rather than sociological account of culture conceptualizing it as a refuge where subjects endeavour to establish ownership over a life that perpetually eludes them the book argues that culture is a claim not something subjects ever have but something they desire not something properly present but a dream of presence an imagination of identity we cultivate care for and materially build in order to assure ourselves that we are sovereign self standing beings

this text brings together clinicians and researchers in psychiatry and mental health the aim is to explore what we can learn from anthropology to achieve a contextual understanding of mental illness and health in contemporary society the book contains a wide selection of ideas and works well to bridge the gap between anthropology and psychiatry

every year leading social anthropologists meet to debate a motion at the heart of current theoretical developments in their subject and this book includes the first six of these debates spanning the period from 1988 to 1993 each debate has four principal speakers one to propose the motion another to oppose it and two seconders the first debate addresses the disciplinary character of social anthropology can it be regarded as a science and if so is it able to establish general propositions about human culture and social life the second examines the concept of society and in the third debate the spotlight is turned on the role of culture in people s perception of their environments the fourth debate focuses on the place of language in the formation of culture the fifth takes up the question of how we view the past in relation to the present finally in the sixth debate the concern is with the cross cultural applicability of the concept of aesthetics with its unique debate format key debates in anthropology addresses issues that are currently at the top of the theoretical agenda which register the pulse of contemporary thinking in social anthropology it will be of value to students who are not only introduced to the different sides of every argument but are challenged to join in and to develop informed positions of their own

in the end of pax americana naoki sakai focuses on u s hegemony s long history in east asia and the effects of its decline on contemporary conceptions of internationality engaging with themes of nationality in conjunction with internationality the civilizational construction of differences between east and west and empire and decolonization sakai focuses on the formation of a nationalism of hikikomori or reclusive withdrawal japan s increasingly inward looking tendency since the late 1990s named for the phenomenon of the nation s young people sequestering themselves from public life sakai argues that the exhaustion of pax americana and the post world war ii international order under which taiwan south korea hong kong and china experienced rapid modernization through consumer capitalism and a media revolution signals neither the decline of the west nor the rise of the east but rather a dislocation and decentering of european and north american political economic diplomatic and intellectual influence this decentering is symbolized by the sense of the loss of old colonial empires such as those of japan britain and the united states

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
