Archaeology Under Dictatorship

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archaeological knowledge is not created in a vacuum and our understanding of the past is profoundly affected by political ideologies in fact a relationship between politics and archaeology develops to some degree in every nation regardless of social and economic circumstances the connections between politics and archaeology become most visible however within a totalitarian dictatorship when a dictator seeks to create and legitimize new state supported ideologies any dictator may attempt to

control and exploit the past often by directly controlling archaeologists the degree to which a nation s archaeological system may continue to be affected after the fall of the dictator depends upon both the previous regime s ideological position and its level of dependence upon archaeology and the response of archaeologists to the regime collectively and individually archaeology under dictatorship demonstrates that the study of archaeology as it evolved under modern dictatorships is today more than ever of critical importance for example in many european countries those who practiced archaeology under dictatorship are retiring or dying in some places their intellectual legacy is being pursued uncritically by a younger generation of archaeologists now is the time therefore to understand how archaeologists have supported and sometimes subverted dictatorial political ideologies in studying archaeology as practiced under totalitarian dictatorship that most harsh of political systems light is shed on the issue of politics and archaeology generally this volume aims to provide a theoretical basis for understanding the specific effects of totalitarian dictatorship upon the practice of archaeology both during and after the dictator's reign the nine essays explore experiences from every corner of the mediterranean from the heartlands of italy spain and greece to the less well known shores of albania and libya with its wide rangeof case studies and strong theoretical orientation this volume is a major advance in the study of the history and politics of archaeology the mediterranean focus will also make it thought provoking reading for classical archaeologists and historians

although much of the world still lives today as always under dictatorship the behaviour of these regimes and of their leaders often appears irrational and mysterious in the political economy of dictatorship ronald wintrobe uses rational choice theory to model dictatorships their strategies for accumulating power the constraints on their behavior and why they are often more popular than is commonly accepted the book explores both the politics and the economics of dictatorships and the interaction between them the questions addressed include what determines the repressiveness of a regime can political authoritarianism be good for the economy after the fall who should be held responsible for crimes against human rights the book contains many applications including chapters on nazi germany soviet communism south africa under apartheid the ancient roman empire and pinochet s chile it also provides a guide to the policies which should be followed by the democracies towards dictatorships

an intra ethnic study of latina o fiction written in the united states from the early 1990s to the present forms of dictatorship examines novels that depict the historical

reality of dictatorship and exploit dictatorship as a literary trope this literature constitutes a new sub genre of latina o fiction which the author calls the latina o dictatorship novel the book illuminates lating os central contributions to the literary history of the dictatorship novel by analyzing how latina o writers with national origin roots in the caribbean mexico and central and south america imaginatively represent authoritarianism the novels collectively generate what harford vargas terms a latina o counter dictatorial imaginary that positions authoritarianism on a continuum of domination alongside imperialism white supremacy heteropatriarchy neoliberalism and border militarization focusing on novels by writers such as junot d az h ctor tobar cristina garc a salvador plascencia and francisco goldman the book reveals how lating o dictatorship novels foreground more ubiquitous modes of oppression to indict latin american dictatorships u s imperialism and structural discrimination in the u s as well as repressive hierarchies of power in general harford vargas simultaneously utilizes formalist analysis to investigate how lating o writers mobilize the genre of the novel and formal techniques such as footnotes focalization emplotment and metafiction to depict dictatorial structures and relations in building on narrative theories of character plot temporality and perspective harford vargas explores how the latina o dictatorship novel stages power dynamics forms of dictatorship thus gueries the relationship between different forms of power and the power of narrative form that is between various instantiations of repressive power structures and the ways in which different narrative structures can reproduce and resist repressive power

the encyclopedia provides a detailed and comprehensive account of the subject known as public choice however the title would not convey sufficiently the breadth of the encyclopedia s contents which can be summarized better as the fruitful interchange of economics political science and moral philosophy on the basis of an image of man as a purposive and responsible actor who pursues his own objectives as efficiently as possible this fruitful interchange between the fields outlined above existed during the late eighteenth century during the brief period of the scottish enlightenment when such great scholars as david hume adam ferguson and adam smith contributed to all these fields and more however as intell tual specialization gradually replaced broad based scholarship from the m nineteenth century onwards it became increasingly rare to find a scholar making major contributions to more than one once alfred marshall defined economics in neoclassical terms as a n row positive discipline the link between economics political science and moral philosophy was all but severed and economists redefined their role into that of the humble dentist providing technical economic information as inputs to improve the performance of impartial benevolent and omniscient governments in their attempts to promote the public interest this indeed was the dominant view within an economics profession that had become besotted by the economics of john maynard keynes and paul samuelson immediately following the end of the second world war

the relationship between heritage and dictatorship has arguably been relatively understudied compared to research on the nation state in recognising the importance of understanding how different political systems can have various and particular outcomes on heritage the impacts of dictatorship on heritage management has developed the concept of authorised dictatorial discourse add to the ever growing and evolving field of heritage studies through the exploration of the various impacts a dictatorship can have on the management and uses of heritage sites this book sets out to examine how a dictator s interests in certain heritage sites and particularly territories can affect how heritage becomes preserved and promoted in both the mid and long terms building on laurajane smith s seminal works on authorised heritage discourse and in her book uses of heritage routledge 2006 this book also seeks to gain a more precise and in depth understanding of the relationship between heritage and dictatorship how authorised discourses on heritage has been exercised and how territory policies that influenced the preservation and promotion of heritage sites have been executed in doing so the impacts of dictatorship on heritage management aims to provide a better insight into demonstrate how and the extent to which the politics of heritage and territory can be interlinked with this type of political system this book will appeal to those with a keen interest in heritage management dictatorship and heritage south korean heritage and theoretical heritage management it will be of particular interest to research students and scholars who are part of this interdisciplinary field

an essential exploration of how authoritarian regimes operate at the local level how do local leaders govern in a large dictatorship what resources do they draw on yoram gorlizki and oleg khlevniuk examine these questions by looking at one of the most important authoritarian regimes of the twentieth century starting in the early years after the second world war and taking the story through to the 1970s they chart the strategies of soviet regional leaders paying particular attention to the forging and evolution of local trust networks

late 1920s through the early years of the cold war during the early 1930s most americans conception of dictatorship focused on the dictator whether viewed as heroic or horrific the dictator was represented as a figure of great masculine power and effectiveness as the great depression gripped the united states a few people including conservative members of the press and some hollywood filmmakers even dared to suggest that dictatorship might be the answer to america s social problems in the late 1930s american explanations of dictatorship shifted focus from individual leaders to the movements that empowered them totalitarianism became the image against which a view of democracy emphasizing tolerance and pluralism and disparaging mass movements developed first used to describe dictatorships of both right and left the term totalitarianism fell out of use upon the u s entry into world war ii with the war s end and the collapse of the u s soviet alliance however concerns about totalitarianism lay the foundation for the emerging cold war
