françois rabelais and the renaissance physiology of invention ingenious animation explores the medical poetics of inventive embodied thinking or ingenuity instantiated in rabelais gargantua and mostly in his quart livre it unsettles established dichotomies in rabelaisian scholarship between rabelais s lowly laughter and his high erudite message and reassesses the rabelaisian grotesque by highlighting its debts to grotesque ornament this marginal yet omnipresent renaissance visual art bodily functions are a trademark of rabelais s poetics scholarship has read them as signs of carnivalesque inversion in line

with the bakhtinian grotesque or of satirical degradation in both instances the lowly is opposed to the high the belly to the head yet for a physician like rabelais the head or the brain as the site of cognition is not opposed to what is below it the chest as the site of breathing the belly and its nether regions as sites of nutrition and generation in renaissance medicine these are integrated physiological systems whose products fuel each other s operations including cognition read through this lens and alongside his diagnosis of the healthy or diseased culture of his time rotting scholasticism the humanist digestion of the classical heritage or the schismatic convulsions shaking christianity rabelais s fictions testify to his reflexive investigation into how culture results from physiological processes fuelling the inventive ability of the human animal made manifest in pedagogical artistic mechanical and spiritual inventions they display the life rather than the truth of culture stemming from human ingenia that is wits conditioned by biological natures while these might be idiosyncratic their animation is fuelled and shaped by the food one eats the air one breathes the places one inhabits the company one keeps in this respect rabelaisian fiction is grotesque in a period sense with its emphasis on hybrid forms capturing the metamorphic powers of animation grotesque ornament reflexively commented on the embodied inventive processes underpinning renaissance mimesis rabelais s fictions display a similar logic they foreground the inventive powers of ingenious animation and articulate reflexive often ironic alternatives to the humanist views they alter a thoroughly embodied anthropology a naturalist genealogy of cultural production and transmission a phantastical account of artistic invention as uncanny liveliness

voice slavery and race in seventeenth century florence argues for the power of sound particularly musical and vocal sounds to systems of racial and ethnic difference foregrounding newly discovered archival sources emily wilbourne documents the significant presence of foreign and racially marked individuals in medici florence many of whom were living under conditions of slavery or unfree labor this book considers how the musical and verbal sounds of these individuals were recruited to represent or communicate access to subjectivity agency and voice

a florentine painter who took dominican vows fra angelico 1400 1455 approached his work as a largely theological project for him the problems of representing the unrepresentable of portraying the divine and the spiritual mitigated the more secular breakthroughs in imitative technique didi huberman explores fra angelico s solutions to these problems his use of color to signal approaching visibility of marble to recall christ s tomb of paint drippings to simulate or stimulate holy anointing he shows how the painter employed emptiness visual transformation and displacement to give form to the mystery of faith in the work of fra angelico an alternate strain of renaissance painting emerges to challenge rather than reinforce verisimilitude didi huberman traces this disruptive impulse through theological writings and iconographic evidence and identifies a widespread tradition in renaissance art that ranges from giotto s break with byzantine image making well into the sixteenth century he reveals how the techniques that served this ultimately religious impulse may have anticipated the more abstract characteristics of modern art such as color fields paint spatterings and the absence of color part of didi huberman s large scale rethinking of art theory and history and the first of his books to appear in english translation fra angelico is a fitting introduction to one of the most original and celebrated writers in the world of art history and criticism

in 1925 the 22 year old kenneth clark 1903 1983 and the legendary art critic and historian bernard berenson 1865 1959 met in italy from that moment they began a correspondence that lasted until berenson s death at age 94 this book makes available for the first time the complete correspondence between two of the most influential figures in the 20th century art world and gives a new and unique insight into their lives and motivations the letters are arranged into ten chronological sections each accompanied by biographical details and providing the context for the events and personalities referred to they were both talented letter writers informative spontaneous humorous gossipy and in their frequent letters they exchanged news and views about art and politics friends and family life collectors connoisseurship discoveries books read and written and travel berenson advised clark on his blossoming career warning against the museum and commercial art worlds while encouraging his promise as a writer and interpreter of the arts above all these letters trace the development of a deep and intimate friendship

ever since the time of francis of assisi a commitment to voluntary poverty has been a controversial aspect of religious life this volume explores the interaction between poverty and religious devotion in the mendicant orders between the thirteenth and fifteenth centuries while poverty has often been perceived more as a franciscan than as a dominican emphasis this volume considers its role within a broader movement of evangelical renewal associated with the mendicant transformation of religious life at a time of increased economic prosperity reformers within the church sought new ways of encouraging identification with the person of christ this volume considers the paradoxical tension between voluntary poverty as a way of emulating christ and involuntary poverty as situation demanding a response from those with the means to help the poor

drawing on history literature and visual arts it explores how the mendicant orders continued to transform religious life into the time of the renaissance the papers in this volume are organised under three headings prefaced with an introductory essay by the editors poverty and the rule of francis exploring the interpretation of poverty in the franciscan order devotional cultures considering aspects of devotional life fostered by mendicant religious communities franciscan augustinian and dominican preaching poverty on the way poverty was promoted and practiced within the dominican order in the later middle ages and renaissance

platonic concerns and conceptions profoundly affected early modern english and continental poetics yet the effects have had little attention this book defines platonism s roles in early modern theories of literature then turns to reappraise the platonizing major poet edmund spenser it makes important new contributions to the knowledge of early modern european poetics and advances our understanding of spenser s role and significance in english literary history literary platonism energized pursuits of the sublime and knowledge of this approach to poetry yields cogent new understandings of spenser s poetics his principal texts his poetic vocation and his cultural influence by combining christian resources with doctrines of platonic poetics such as the poet s and lover s inspirational furies the revelatory significance of beauty and the importance of imitating exalted ideals rather than the world he sought to attain a visionary sublimity that would ensure his enduring national significance and he thereby became a seminal figure in the english literary line of vision including milton and blake among others although readings of spenser s shepheardes calender typically bypass plato s phaedrus this text deeply informs the calender s treatments of beauty inspiration poetry s psychagogic power and its national responsibilities in the faerie queene both heroism and visionary poetics arise from the stimuli of love and beauty conceived platonically and idealized mimesis produces its faeryland faery s queen projected from elizabeth i as in platonic idealization of the beloved not only pertains to temporal governance but also points toward the transcendental ideas and divinity whereas plato s republic valorizes philosophy for bringing enlightenment to counter society s illusions spenser champions the learned and enraptured poetic imagination and proceeds as such a philosopher poet
