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still remarkably vivid it is easier to read this for pure pleasure than just about any other ancient text nicholas lezard guardian ovid s sensuous and witty poem begins with the creation of the world and brings together a dazzling array of mythological tales ingeniously linked by the idea of transformation often as a result of love or lust where men and women find themselves magically changed into extraordinary new beings including the well known stories of daedalus and icarus pyramus and thisbe pygmalion perseus and andromeda and the fall of troy the metamorphoses has influenced writers and artists from shakespeare and chaucer to picasso and ted hughes this translation by david raeburn is in hexameter verse which brilliantly captures the energy and spontaneity of the original translated by david raeburn with an introduction by denis feeney

perhaps no other classical text has proved its versatility so much as ovid s epic poem a staple of undergraduate courses in classical studies latin english and comparative literature metamorphoses is arguably one of the most important canonical latin texts and certainly among the most widely read and studied ovid s metamorphoses a reader s guide is the ideal companion to this epic classical text offering guidance on literary historical and cultural context

printers in the early modern low countries produced no fewer than 152 editions of ovid s metamorphoses john tholen investigates what these editions can tell us about the early modern application of the popular ancient text analysis of paratexts shows for example how editors and commentators guide readers to ovid s potentially subversive contents paratextual infrastructures intended to create commercial credibility but simultaneously were a response to criticism of reading the metamorphoses this book combines two often separated fields of research book history and reception studies it provides a compelling case study of how investigation into the material contexts of ancient texts sheds new light on early modern receptions of antiquity

metamorphoses is an epic poem but is very different from what we expect in an epic original inventive and charming the poem tells the stories of myths featuring transformations from the creation of the universe to the death and deification of julius caesar book iii concentrates on the house of thebes and this selection details the story of pentheus and his tragic end after refusing to acknowledge the god bacchus this edition contains the latin text as well as in depth commentary notes which provide language support explanation of difficult words and phrases and analysis of literary features as well as information on the background to the story the introduction presents an overview of ovid in his historical and literary context as well as a plot synopsis and a discussion of the literary genre and metre all words in the text are given in a full vocabulary at the end and there are also suggestions for further reading this is the prescribed edition of the verse set text for ocr s as gce classics latin qualification for examination from 2015 to 2017 inclusive

in ovid and the cultural politics of early modern england liz oakley brown considers english versions of the metamorphoses a poem concerned with translation and transformation on a multiplicity of levels as important sites of social and historical difference from the fifteenth to the early eighteenth centuries through the exploration of a range of canonical and marginal texts from shakespeare s titus andronicus to women s embroideries of ovidian myths oakley brown argues that translation is central to the construction of national and gendered identities

ovid s metamorphoses has entranced audiences for two thousand years from rome under augustus to humanities classrooms today borrowing liberally from greek and roman mythology the poem tells hundreds of stories that share one essential theme each tale depicts a transformation from one physical form into another drawing on many years of teaching the metamorphoses gareth williams offers a brisk and lively reading of the poem that emphasizes why it speaks in compelling ways to a twenty first century audience he shows how the metamorphoses is not just a colorful collection of stories about change but an exploration of change itself ovid challenges us to recognize flux as fundamental to human experience circumstances shift fortunes ebb and flow and our very identities ceaselessly evolve across from one life stage to another capturing the energy and excitement that ovid s poem generates among readers williams also sheds new light on its modern provocations his fresh interpretations of the metamorphoses reveal its power to enrich and inform our daily existence amid the uncertainties of life today

elizabethan english culture is saturated with tales and figures from ovid s metamorphoses while most of these narratives interrogate metamorphosis and transformation many tales such as those of philomela hecuba or orpheus also highlight heightened states of emotion especially in powerless or seemingly powerless characters when these tales are translated and retold in the new cultural context of renaissance england a distinct politics of ovidian emotion emerges through intertextual readings in diverse cultural contexts ovid and the politics of emotion in elizabethan england reveals the ways these representations helped redefine emotions and the political efficacy of emotional expression in sixteenth century england

metamorphosis is a new classic of natural history a book that by unveiling a mystery of nature causes us to relearn ourselves

why has the myth of pygmalion and his ivory statue proved so inspirational for writers artists philosophers scientists and directors and creators of films and television series the authorised version of the story appears in the epic poem of transformations metamorphoses by the first century ce latin poet ovid in which the bard orpheus narrates the legend of the sculptor king of cyprus whose beautiful carved woman was brought to life by the goddess venus focusing on screen storylines with a pygmalion subtext from silent cinema to buffy the vampire slayer and lars and the real girl this book looks at why and how the made over or manufactured woman has survived through the centuries and what we can learn about this problematic model of perfection from the perspective of the past and the present given the myriad representations of ovid s myth can we really make a modern text a tool of interpretation for an ancient poem this book answers with a resounding yes and explains why it is so important to give antiquity back its future

many small renaissance portraits were richly adorned with covers or backs bearing allegorical figures mythological scenes or emblems that celebrated the sitter and invited the viewer to decipher their meaning hidden faces includes seventy objects ranging in format from covered paintings to miniature boxes that illuminate the symbiotic relationship between the portrait and its pair texts by thirteen distinguished scholars vividly illustrate that the other faces of these portraits represent some of the most innovative images of the renaissance created by masters such as hans memling and titian uniting works that have in some cases been separated for centuries this fascinating volume shows how the multifaceted format unveiled the sitter s identity both by physically revealing the portrait and reading the significance behind its cover

from amateur experiments in scrapbooks and stereographs to contemporary photobook collaborations between leading practitioners poets and photographers have created an art form that continues to evolve and deserves critical exploration photopoetry 1845 2015 a critical history represents the first account of this challenging and diverse body of work nott traces the development of photopoetic collaboration from its roots in 19th century illustrative practices to the present day focusing on work from the uk and us he examines how and why poets and photographers collaborate and explores the currents of exchange and engagement between poems and photographs on the page the book not only considers canonical figures but brings to light forgotten practitioners whose work questioned and shaped the

relationship between word and image photopoetry 1845 2015 a critical history provides a new lens through which to explore poetry photography and the spaces between them

this book tracks how concepts of reading developed within italian texts including dante s vita nova boccaccio s filostrato and teseida and petrarch s seniles impress themselves upon chaucer s troilus and criseyde and canterbury tales

the years 1780 to 1820 have long been seen as the golden age of the english satirical print this period witnessed a number of changes in style which had far reaching consequences including an increase in the effectiveness of the caricature as visual propaganda william pitt the younger and charles james fox were the leading politicians of the age continuing a family rivalry begun by their fathers they were amongst the most caricatured men of their time and became emblems of the two sides of the political debate whilst gathering personal followings based upon personality rather than filial or political patronage fox and pitt the younger came to represent a more modern notion of the party leader in an age before formalized political parties and structures neil howe here shows how stock images came to the fore and examines the central role they played within the visual representation of politicians during the late eighteenth century his book also chronicles how the biggest political rivalry of the age played out within contemporary caricature from the emergence of fox and pitt as big political beasts in the wake of the american revolution though the east india bill crisis regency crisis and french revolution to the death of both men in 1806

dynamic matter investigates the life histories of renaissance objects eschewing the critical tendency to study how objects relate to human needs and desires this work foregrounds the objects themselves demonstrating their potential to transform their environments as they travel across time and space integrating early modern material theories with recent critical approaches in actor network theory and object oriented ontology this volume extends aristotle s theory of dynameos which conceptualizes matter as potentiality and applies it to objects featured in early modern texts such as edmund spenser s the faerie queene robert hooke s micrographia and william shakespeare s the tempest individual chapters explore the dynameos of matter by examining its manifestations in particular forms combs are inscribed with words and brushed through human hair feathers are incorporated into garments and artwork prince rupert s glasswork drops explode a whale becomes animated by the power of a magical bracelet and books are drowned these case studies highlight the potentiality matter itself

possesses and that which it activates in other matter a theorization of objects grounded in renaissance materialist thought dynamic matter examines the richness of things themselves the larger multiple and changing networks in which things circulate and the networks created by these transformative objects in addition to the editor the contributors to this volume include anna riehl bertolet erika mary boeckeler naomi howell emily e f philbrick josie schoel maria shmygol edward mclean test abbie weinberg and sarah f williams

the volume provides readers with a clear introduction to english renaissance literary texts concise but detailed entries are alphabetically arranged providing a coherent overview of central issues in the study of writings of the renaissance era cross referencing and suggestions for further reading indicate connections between topics

taking ovid s metamorphoses as its starting point this book analyses fantastic creatures including werewolves bear children and dragons in english literature from the reformation to the late seventeenth century susan wiseman tracks the idea of transformation through classical literary sacred physiological folkloric and ethnographic texts under modern disciplinary protocols these areas of writing are kept apart but this study shows that in the renaissance they were woven together by shared resources frames of knowledge and readers drawing on a rich collection of critical and historical studies and key philosophical texts including descartes meditations wiseman outlines the importance of metamorphosis as a significant literary mode her examples range from canonical literature including shakespeare s a midsummer night s dream and the tempest to thomas browne on dragons together with popular material arguing that the seventeenth century is marked by concentration on the potential of the human and the world to change or be changed

artworks that does not rely on existing models of musical analysis or on established modes of literary criticism thereby avoiding privileging one discipline over the other it will be of particular significance for scholars students and performers with an interest in russian and soviet music the intersection between music and poetry and the history of russian and east european culture politics and identity during the twentieth century
