tucked away in a garden on the edge of paris is a multimedia archive like no other albert kahn s archives de la plant to 1908 1931 kahn s vast photo cinematographic experiment preserved world memory through the privileged lens of everyday life and counter archive situates this project in its biographic intellectual and cinematic contexts tracing the archive s key influences such as the philosopher henri bergson the geographer jean brunhes and the biologist jean comandon paula amad maps an alternative landscape of french cultural modernity in which vitalist philosophy cross pollinated with early film theory documentary film with the avant garde cinematic models of temporality with the early annales school of history and film s appropriation of the planet with human geography and colonial ideology at the heart of the book is an insightful meditation upon the transformed concept of the archive in the age of cinema and an innovative argument about film s counter archival challenge to history the first comprehensive

study of kahn's films counter archive also offers a vital historical perspective on debates involving archives media and memory

this book brings the study of nineteenth century illustrations into the digital age the key issues discussed include the difficulties of making illustrations visible online the mechanisms for searching the content of illustrations and the politics of crowdsourced image tagging analyzing a range of online resources the book offers a conceptual and critical model for engaging with and understanding nineteenth century illustration through its interplay with the digital in its exploration of the intersections between historic illustrations and the digital the book is of interest to those working in illustration studies digital humanities word and image nineteenth century studies and visual culture

rachel bryant davies and erin johnson williams lead a cast of renowned scholars to initiate an interdisciplinary conversation about the mechanisms of power that have shaped the nineteenth century archive to ask what is a nineteenth century archive broadly defined this landmark collection of essays will broach critical and topical questions about how the complex discourses of power involved in constructions of the nineteenth century archive have impacted and continue to impact constructions of knowledge across disciplinary boundaries and beyond academic confines the essays written from a range of disciplinary perspectives grapple with urgent problems of how to deal with potentially sensitive nineteenth century archival items both within academic scholarship and in present day public facing institutions which often reflect erotic colonial and imperial racist sexist violent or elitist ideologies each contribution grapples with these questions from a range of perspectives musicology classics english history visual culture and museums and archives the result is far reaching historical excavation of archival experiences

in archives of labor lori merish establishes working class women as significant actors within literary culture dramatically redrawing the map of nineteenth century us literary and cultural history delving into previously unexplored archives of working class women s literature from autobiographies pamphlet novels and theatrical melodrama to seduction tales and labor periodicals merish recovers working class women s vital presence as writers and readers in the antebellum era her reading of texts by a diverse collection of factory workers seamstresses domestic workers and prostitutes boldly challenges the purportedly masculine character of class dissent during this era whether addressing portrayals of white new england factory girls fictional accounts of african american domestic workers or the first person narratives of mexican women working in the missions of mexican california merish unsettles the traditional association of whiteness with the working class to document forms of cross racial class identification and solidarity in so doing she restores the tradition of working women s class protest and dissent shows how race and gender are central

to class identity and traces the ways working women understood themselves and were understood as workers and class subjects

this volume presents a nuanced exploration of how illustrated magazines shaped global visual culture between 1910 and 1970 in the early to mid twentieth century the vast majority of printed photographs appeared in the pages of illustrated magazines publications such as life china pictorial drum picture post and ebony did more than showcase photographs they crafted visual narratives by combining images text and graphics into influential cultural artifacts these periodicals shaped public perception and mass media consensus like the internet does today bringing a shared visual experience to homes and newsstands around the world the essays in this volume delve into the technologies and visual strategies behind these publications showing how their layouts were affected by political commercial editorial and artistic factors leading up to world war ii the commentaries also explore how democracy dictatorships colonization and modernity at large gave rise to experimental magazine designs turning avant garde art and lifestyle reporting into popular formats featuring over 150 images print matters traces how illustrated magazines evolved across countries and continents offering new insights into their history and enduring impact on culture and society

william clark russell wrote more than forty nautical novels immensely popular in their time his works were admired by contemporary writers such as conan doyle stevenson and meredith while swinburne considered him the greatest master of the sea living or dead based on extensive archival research nash explores this remarkable career

sheona beaumont addresses the untold story of biblical subjects in photography she argues that stories characters and symbols from the bible are found to pervade photographic practices and ideas across the worlds of advertising and reportage the book and the gallery in theoretical discourse and in the words of photographers themselves beaumont engages interpretative tools from biblical reception studies art history and visual culture criticism in order to present four terms for describing photography s latent spirituality the index the icon the tableau and the vision throughout her journey she includes lively discussion of selected fine art photography dealing with the bible in surprising ways from images by william henry fox talbot in the 19th century to david mach in the 21st far from telling a secular story photography and the conditions of its representations are exposed in theological depth beaumont skillfully interweaves discussion of the images and theology arguing for the dynamic and potent voice of the bible in photography and enriching visual culture criticism with a renewed religious understanding

millionaire shopping is the first full detailed and original account of the huge and unstoppable collecting and patronage of alfred morrison 1821 1897 who was one of the most important but lesser known victorian collectors and patrons of the arts morrison was an obsessive his collections evidence the extravagant deployment of limitless wealth this wonderfully illustrated book includes images from public and private collections across the world many of which have never previously been published each chapter is written by an expert in the field and dedicated to a particular aspect of morrison s collecting and patronage morrison collected old masters and contemporary art thousands of engraved portraits autograph manuscripts coins medals and imperial chinese porcelain his manuscript collection the largest in private hands included letters from leonardo da vinci and jane austen he commissioned exquisite pieces from artists such as charles lepec and pl\(\text{\text{cion}}\) cauloaga he also commissioned furniture from owen jones including the unique alhambra ceilings in his london house on his wiltshire estate he bred prize winning sheep and commissioned cottages from george devey morrison s collections were dispersed worldwide and the recent re appraisal of his taste means that many of his prized objects are now worth millions of pounds

the victorian mind's eye reading literature in an age of illustration the victorians lived in an age of illustration in a matter of decades words and images had become enmeshed and entangled printed alongside each other in a spectacular array of printed forms the exponential growth of illustration not only radically changed literature but also changed the way that literature was read this book offers a major conceptualisation of the difference that pictures made to the reading of words analysing an extensive range of illustrated material and drawing on the accounts of victorian readers reviewers authors artists and psychologists the book describes how the victorians characterised the effects of illustration and how illustrations in turn elicited and anticipated responses from their readers what emerges from these sources is the notion of a distinct mode of reading that determined readers material and mental engagements with illustrated literature the presence of images on the page was said to impact on whether readers created images in their mind as they read illustrations generated feelings of pleasure or displeasure they determined what was read first what was recalled and what was etched in the memory by peering into the recesses of the mind's eye this book identifies the cognitive mechanisms and cultural politics that were central to how the victorians described their reading of illustrated literature it suggests the significance of these ideas of reading for understanding the

place of illustration in victorian culture and the relation between words pictures and historical values and meanings illustration was fundamental to how the victorians read and to how we read the victorians

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
