the great diversity of contexts in which the term postmodernism is currently encountered reflects the remarkable success of a coinage that

has been in circulation for only about forty years it has been used by philosophers sociologists art critics and literary historians to become finally a household word in the language of advertising and politics before letting it fade to a derelict cliché an attempt is made in this volume of essays to use its potential as a cultural concept for the analysis and understanding of contemporary literature and thought

one of the unique voices in our century james merrill was known for his mastery of prosody his ability to write books that were not just collected poems but unified works in which each individual poem contributed to the whole and his astonishing evolution from the formalist lyric tradition that influenced his early work to the spiritual epics of his later career merrill s accomplishments were recognized with a pulitzer prize in 1977 for divine comedies and a national book critics circle award in 1983 for the changing light at sandover in this meticulously researched carefully argued work evans lansing smith argues that the nekyia the circular homeric narrative describing the descent into the underworld and reemergence in the same or similar place confers shape and significance upon the entirety of james merrill s poetry smith illustrates how pervasive this myth is in merrill s work not just in the changing light at sandover where it naturally serves as the central premise of the entire trilogy but in all of the poet s books before and after that central text by focusing on the details of versification and prosody smith demonstrates the ingenious fusion of form and content that distinguishes merrill as a poet moving beyond purely literary interpretations of the poetry smith illuminates the numerous allusions to music art theology philosophy religion and mythology found throughout merrill s work

edited and introduced by stephen edred flowers ph d this book opens the gate to the use of the authentic hermetic formulas concealed in the magical papyri of egypt students can use this information as a basis for developing and enacting their own magical systems organized in four parts history theory practice and operation in the form of the magical papyrus of abaris illustrated glossary index

john barth s eminence as a postmodernist is indisputable however much of the criticism dealing with his work is prompted by his own theories of exhaustion and subsequent replenishment leaving his writing relatively untouched by theories of postmodernism in general this book changes that by focusing on the relationship between barth s aesthetic and the ideology critique of the historical avant gardes which were the first to mobilize art against itself and its institutional practices and demands examining barth s metafictional parodies in the light of theories of space and subjectivity clavier engages the question of ideology critique in postmodernism by offering the montage as a possible model for understanding barth s fiction in such a light postmodernism may well be perceived as a mimesis of reality particularly a recognition of the collective nature of self and the world

postmodernity allows for no absolutes and no essence yet theology is concerned with the absolute the essential how then does theology sit within postmodernity is postmodern theology possible or is such a concept a contradiction in terms should theology bother about postmodernism or just get on with its own thing can it theologians have responded in many different ways to the challenges posed by theories of postmodernity in this introductory 2003 guide to a complex area editor kevin j vanhoozer addresses the issue head on in a lively survey of what talk about god might mean in a postmodern age and vice versa the book then offers examples of different types of contemporary theology in relation to postmodernity while the second part examines the key christian doctrines in postmodern perspective leading theologians contribute to this clear and informative companion which no student of theology should be without

stoeicheia an alphabet that acted as a map for understanding the order of the cosmos he demonstrates how this alphabet of magical symbols was the template for the tarot the author also shows how the 22 major arcana cards were related to the 22 letters of the roman alphabet used for oracular purposes in ancient times looking in depth at the principles of mithraism the author explains how the roman form of mithraism a guiding factor in the early shaping of the tarot was itself a synthesis of iranian magianism greek stoicism babylonian astrology and greco egyptian hermeticism exploring the cards themselves flowers then looks at the original meanings of the major arcana using mithraic symbolism and its offshoots he also explains the truth behind many of the myths surrounding the tarot including their deep level connections with egypt the romani people the semitic tradition and runes by restoring the original mysteria to the icons of the tarot and learning their true origins we can better understand the insight these powerful cards impart in divination

with the basic premise as the presentation of the idea of an aesthetic ideal as a metaphor for the metaphysical absurdism the fact that if we were to say that there are no true or untrue objects the object of the discussion to be found within the idea of the absurd crumbles author mihajlo bugarinovic has though it may not seem so written a book that belongs to the metaphysics branch of philosophy in a fashion that may very well be compared to the copernican revolution that immanuel kant identified himself with with critique of pure reason its style is like a cross between nietzsche wittgenstein heidegger and hegel this is mihajlo bugarinovic s third book he lives in vancouver
