this book explains how the brain interacts with the social world and why stories matter how do our brains enable us to tell and follow stories and how do stories affect our minds in stories and the brain paul b armstrong analyzes the cognitive processes involved in constructing and exchanging stories exploring their role in the neurobiology of mental functioning armstrong argues that the ways in which stories order events in time imitate actions and relate our experiences to others lives are correlated to cortical processes of temporal binding the circuit between action and perception and the mirroring operations underlying embodied intersubjectivity he reveals how recent neuroscientific findings about how the brain works how it assembles neuronal syntheses without a central controller illuminate cognitive processes involving time action and self other relations that are central to narrative an extension of his previous book how literature plays with the brain this new study applies armstrong s analysis of the cognitive value of aesthetic harmony and dissonance to narrative armstrong explains how narratives help the brain negotiate the neverending conflict between its need for pattern synthesis and constancy and its need for flexibility adaptability and openness to change the neuroscience of these interactions is part of the reason stories give shape to our lives even as our lives give rise to stories taking up the age old question of what our

ability to tell stories reveals about language and the mind this truly interdisciplinary project should be of interest to humanists and cognitive scientists alike

narratives enable readers to vividly experience fictional and non fictional contexts writers use a variety of language features to control these experiences they direct readers in how to construct contexts how to draw inferences and how to identify the key parts of a story writers can skilfully convey physical sensations prompt emotional states effect moral responses and even alter the readers attitudes mind brain and narrative examines the psychological and neuroscientific evidence for the mechanisms which underlie narrative comprehension the authors explore the scientific developments which demonstrate the importance of attention counterfactuals depth of processing perspective and embodiment in these processes in so doing this timely interdisciplinary work provides an integrated account of the research which links psychological mechanisms of language comprehension to humanities work on narrative and style

this book encourages cross disciplinary dialogues toward introducing a new framework for neuro narratology expanding on established theory within cognitive narratology to more fully encompass the different faculties involved in the reading process to investigate narrative cognition the book traces the ways in which cognitive patterns of embodiment and the neural connections that comprise them in the reading process are translated into patterns in narrative fiction drawing theories of episodic memories and nonvisual perception of space farmasi draws on theories of episodic memories and nonvisual perception of space in analyzing a range of narratives from twentieth century prose the first set of analyses shines a light on perception and emotion in narrative discourses and the construction of storyworlds while the second foregrounds the reader s experience the volume makes the case for the fact that narratives need to be understood as dynamic elements of the interaction between mind body and environment generating new insights and inspiring further research this book will appeal to scholars interested in narrative theory literary studies cognitive science neuroscience and philosophy

means more data is available than ever the trouble is most people aren t very numerate or good at statistics many find it hard to look at data and extract insights meanwhile those for whom numbers hold no fear don t always make the best storytellers they mistakenly believe they need to prove their point by showing their workings there are some simple and effective rules of data driven storytelling that help everyone tell more compelling evidence based stories whoever they need to convince narrative by numbers shows you how

application of analytic discourse techniques to clinical practice is relatively recent this book s contributors begin with the notion that systematic examination of discourse provides a rich source of data for describing the complex relationships among language social context and the cognitive processes that underlie discourse comprehension and production evidence is provided that when discourse is studied across different clinical populations analysis yields an optimal opportunity for developing dynamic models of brain and language that more thoroughly account for the complexity of language use in social contexts accordingly studies presented in this volume have a dual focus to examine the implications of discourse research on neurolinguistic theories and to evaluate the contribution of discourse analysis to understanding the clinical status of patients with brain damage as such this volume reports patterns of preserved and impaired discourse behavior in normal adults and in different adult clinical populations it also describes numerous tasks designed to elicit a variety of discourse genres and a host of techniques created to describe how subjects order information and relate ideas across sentences in addition it includes numerous abstract units and linguistic devices targeted to examine those aspects of discourse that govern cohesion organization and topic manipulation this volume is unique because it presents both theoretical and clinical papers that examine a variety of communication pathologies clinicians often report dissatisfaction with formal test batteries in that results are often at variance with clinical observation of performance in real life situations to address this concern this work proposes methods for examining discourse that move the examiner closer to naturalistic sampling the research presented demonstrates that discourse analysis provides clinically significant information that contributes to the understanding of the cognitive linguistic and social status of people with communication disorders these studies also offer a framework to support continuously evolving diagnostic and treatment paradigms for adults with neurological communication pathologies

an investigation of the emotional power of narrative that illuminates the relationship between the human brain and the stories we tell as humans we think in stories stories that allow us to feel and share emotions in order for this phenomenon to work our brains and the ways in which we tell stories must be attuned to each other but how exactly does this happen tapping into the essence of thinking in stories fritz breithaupt draws on the latest scientific research including a retelling study comparable to the telephone game with more than 12 000 participants and experiments in which chatgpt functions as storyteller this wide ranging study includes analyses of political history novels fairy tales and everyday office gossip proposes a new theory of narrative that focuses on emotions and affects and hypothesizes on the evolution of narratives among our hominid ancestors redefining us as beings who anchor ourselves in the world through narratives breithaupt introduces a new kind of psychology that cuts to the core of how and why humans feel the need to tell stories

the renowned naturalist loren eisely observed that we humans have given up the certainty of the animal

that what it senses is exactly there in the shape the eye beholds the big question is what did we get in return this book provides a convincing answer to this question arguing that instead of recording reality your brain uses your experience to create a story a narrative about how what happened to you in the past led to what is happening to you now this narrative is your private reality the book continues by showing how replacing recorded reality with private narrative enabled humans to anticipate the fundamentally unknowable immediate and remote future and expose potential threats it then shows how private narrative enabled complex thought and communication with others drawing upon a wide range of research the book provides a stimulating new way of viewing human experience thinking communicating and action

in his new book dr heemsbergen shows that the best insights into leadership can come not from what leaders are thinking but from how leaders think the author suggests a fresh approach to how leaders can think and describes the necessary processes and tools required to improve the leader s capability in volatile and complex times leveraging extensive research findings and observations the author makes some unexpected connections between brain research and how leaders think the artistic process our knowledge of the nonconscious and leadership development heemsbergen a psychologist university lecturer and developer of leaders has developed new powerful metaphor tools from artistic practice and brain research to help leaders probe deeply into their perceptions thoughts and emotions and uncover those things that they don t even know they don t know there is much that goes on in the mind that we re not aware of and most of what influences what leaders say and do occurs below the water line of the iceberg at the nonconscious level that s why need new methods techniques and tools are required to get at what leaders don t know they know leaders also need to develop a beginner s mind become better sensors and see things with fresh eyes much of what leaders do in organizations is based on the idea of finding the right answer to a question unfortunately it is often assumed there is only one right answer and we do not need to think about the topic further in real life much of what is known is in a state of flux waiting for a new bit of evidence to modify the knowledge to assist leaders in becoming more effective the author has developed methods and tools based on neuropsychology psychoanalysis and artistic practice he calls it the h sat the heemsbergen sensory awareness tools these tools assist in uncovering the mental models that guide leadership behavior illuminating leadership blindspots and improving leadership decision making capability heemsbergen concludes the eye ear and body have been the most important tools for the gathering of information since the dawn of time using time tested methods of artistic practice in combination with breakthroughs in brain research opens the possibility for uncovering hidden leadership talent to deal more effectively with a complex and volatile world
