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sandra gilgan's utopia in the revival of confucian education examines the classics reading movement in contemporary china as not only driven by attraction to certain elements of tradition but even more by caesuras in the past that caused people to detach from their cultural roots the author argues that activism in the classics reading movement arises from an entanglement of past present and future social and political upheaval in the near past of the twentieth century caused people to disconnect from their traditional culture and ways of living resulting in the present need to reconnect with perceived original culture and tradition from the more distant past through peoples imaginaries of a better future that are informed by past traditions new ways of the past find entrance into life and education in study halls and academies this new study draws on multi sited ethnographic field research in ten chinese cities with the broadest database currently available it combines theoretical elements from anthropology history sociology and sinology in a grounded theory approach as an interdisciplinary study the book is of interest for academics in asian and chinese studies heritage and memory studies religious studies educational sciences history and cultural anthropology as well as social and political sciences

reading groups have grown rapidly in popularity and continue to be a significant cultural phenomenon reading groups in public libraries linked to the learning and social inclusion agenda have expanded to include a wide range of groups within society including people with visual impairments vips this under researched area is the focus of this book library based vip reading groups are interesting on many levels given that these groups predominantly use audio versions of the text rather than print this links to debates about the changing nature of reading in a multi modal age this book discusses whether contemporary society still defines reading as a visual activity or whether technological developments have led to a broadening of the definition of reading the author goes on to discuss how policy is translated into practice within the library context and whether the wide range of reading groups linked to libraries suggests that libraries understand and are taking the social inclusion agenda seriously she also explores how effectively libraries are using reading groups as a tool for delivering on the agenda for learning and how this sits within wider priorities for post compulsory education and lifelong learning finally the book suggests ideas for future development for these groups outlining ways in which their potential could be maximised for the benefit of both the library and the reading group members the book will be of great

interest to professional librarians as well as students and scholars of librarianship it will also be of interest to those working on the emerging field of reading groups in literary studies those interested in the role of reading in education as well as disability scholars will also find the book useful

in this book xiong yuezhi and a team of distinguished scholars bring together cutting edge research on the urban history of shanghai and the diversity of its distinctive culture

occupying an interstitial space between chinese and foreign power shanghai from the mid nineteenth to the mid twentieth century experienced almost unimaginably complex developments in its political social economic and cultural history to untangle this complexity xiong and his team have carefully constructed in thematic and chronological fashion the interactions between the imperialist powers foreign settlers and the chinese community of shanghai from the origins of the racially segregated international settlement in the 1840s to the internment of foreign settlers in shanghai during world war ii in the 1940s

as the second volume of a two volume set on the history of chinese phonology this book studies the history of phonology from the yuan dynasty until modern times and discusses the four approaches of sound change based on abundant phonological materials the author divides the history of chinese phonology into nine historical periods which helps illuminate its evolutions and principles following on from the first volume the first part of this second volume deals with the initials rhymes and tones of chinese phonology from the yuan dynasty 1279 1368 to modern times since 1911 illustrating the diachronic sound changes with detailed tables based on an historical review of chinese phonology the second part of the book classifies sound changes via four major approaches no change gradual shift split and merger it then analyzes the natural conditional and irregular sound changes respectively and the reasons for these changes this title will be of great value for scholars and students studying chinese phonology and chinese linguistics and readers interested in the essence of rhyming behind chinese classic lyrics poetry drama and other forms of verse

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
