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this concise yet lively new survey guides the reader through 5 000 years of indian art and architecture a rich artistic tradition is fully explored through the hindu buddhist islamic colonial and contemporary periods incorporating discussion of modern bangladesh and pakistan tribal artists and the decorative

arts combining a clear overview with fascinating detail mitter succeeds in bringing to life the true diversity of indian culture the influence of islam on the mughal court which produced the world famous taj mahal and exquisite miniature paintings is closely examined more recently he discusses the nationalist and global concerns of contemporary art including the rise of female artists the stunning architecture of charles correa and the vibrant art scene the very particular character of indian art is set within its cultural and religious milieu raising important issues about the profound differences between western and indian ideas of beauty and eroticism in art

partha mitter s book is a pioneering study of the history of modern art on the indian subcontinent from 1850 to 1922 the author tells the story of indian art during the raj set against the interplay of colonialism and nationalism the work addresses the tensions and contradictions that attended the advent of european naturalism in india as part of the imperial design for the westernisation of the elite and traces the artistic evolution from unquestioning westernisation to the construction of hindu national identity through a wide range of literary and pictorial sources art and nationalism in colonial india balances the study of colonial cultural institutions and networks with the ideologies of the nationalist and intellectual movements which followed the result is a book of immense significance both in the context of south asian history and in the wider context of art history

the triumph of modernism probes the intricate interplay of western modernism and indian nationalism in the evolution of colonial era indian art

this book explores modern art in india tracing its evolution from the setting up of the progressive artists group in the 1940s to the contemporary movements today it discusses some of the fundamental issues around indian art such as the extent of its rootedness in the country the amalgamation of western art methods and indian aesthetics in the art and its increasing infusion with popular modes in a series of essays the book looks at works from the late mughal period when artists began to move towards modernism to the visionary approaches of artists like rabindranath tagore nandalal bose ramkinkar baij and benodebehari mukherjee in santiniketan it also explores innovative works of the indo hungarian artist amrita sher gil and contributions of progressive artists such as francis newton souza sayed haider raza and m f husain to the new and experimental forms being practised in the present highlighting the transformative role of modern indian art through the twentieth century as the works of each successive generation reflect the socio cultural contexts with rich illustrations the book will be of interest to students and educators of art art history intellectual and cultural history as well as to connoisseurs of art

this pioneering work traces the emergence of the modern and contemporary art of muslim south asia in relation to transnational modernism and in light of the region s intellectual cultural and political developments art historian iftikhar dadi here explores the art and writings of major artists men and women ranging from the late colonial period to the era of independence and beyond he looks at the stunningly diverse artistic production of key artists associated with pakistan including abdur rahman chughtai zainul abedin shakir ali zubeida agha sadeguain rasheed araeen and naiza khan dadi shows how beginning in the 1920s these artists addressed the challenges of modernity by translating historical and contemporary intellectual conceptions into their work reworking traditional approaches to the classical islamic arts and engaging the modernist approach towards subjective individuality in artistic expression in the process they dramatically reconfigured the visual arts of the region by the 1930s these artists had embarked on a sustained engagement with international modernism in a context of dizzying social and

political change that included decolonization the rise of mass media and developments following the national independence of india and pakistan in 1947 bringing new insights to such concepts as nationalism modernism cosmopolitanism and tradition dadi underscores the powerful impact of transnationalism during this period and highlights the artists growing embrace of modernist and contemporary artistic practice in order to address the challenges of the present era

an engrossing and definitive narrative account of history and myth that offers a new way of understanding one of the world s oldest major religions the hindus elucidates the relationship between recorded history and imaginary worlds hinduism does not lend itself easily to a strictly chronological account many of its central texts cannot be reliably dated even within a century its central tenets karma dharma to name just two arise at particular moments in indian history and differ in each era between genders and caste to caste and what is shared among hindus is overwhelmingly outnumbered by the things that are unique to one group or another yet the greatness of hinduism its vitality its earthiness its vividness lies precisely in many of those idiosyncratic qualities that continue to inspire debate today wendy doniger is one of the foremost scholars of hinduism in the world with her inimitable insight and expertise doniger illuminates those moments within the tradition that resist forces that would standardize or establish a canon without reversing or misrepresenting the historical hierarchies she reveals how sanskrit and vernacular sources are rich in knowledge of and compassion toward women and lower castes how they debate tensions surrounding religion violence and tolerance and how animals are the key to important shifts in attitudes toward different social classes the hindus brings a fascinating multiplicity of actors and stories to the stage to show how brilliant and creative thinkers many of them far removed from brahmin authors of sanskrit texts have kept hinduism alive in ways that other scholars have not fully explored in this unique and authoritative account debates about hindu traditions become platforms from which to consider the ironies and overlooked epiphanies of history

this book is the first systematic study of the genealogy discursive structures and political implications of the concept

of greater india implying a hindu colonization of southeast asia and used by extension to argue for a past indian greatness as a colonial power reproducible in the present and future from the 1880s to the 1960s protagonists of the greater india theme attempted to make a case for the importance of an expansionist indian civilisation in civilizing southeast asia the argument was extended to include central asia africa north and south america and other regions where indian migrants were to be found the advocates of this indocentric and hindu revivalist approach with hindu and indian often taken to be synonymous were involved in a quintessentially parochial project despite its apparently international dimensions to justify an indian expansionist imagination that viewed india s past as a colonizer and civilizer of other lands as a model for the restoration of that past greatness in the future zabarskaite shows that the crucial ideologues and elements used for the formation of the construct of greater india can be traced to the svadeśī movement of the turn of the century and that greater india moved easily between the domains of the scholarly and the popular as it sought to establish itself as a form of nationalist self assertion

this beautifully illustrated book explores the opinions of artists critics and others involved with arts or crafts arguing for a theory that considers the different discursive formations and related strategic practices of an art world focusing on orissan patta paintings in india the author examines the local regional and national discourses involved in so doing the text demonstrates that while painters local discourses characterised by pragmatism the discourses of regional and especially national elites are concerned with the exegesis of local paintings and their association with the great sanskrit tradition a central theme of the study focuses on the awards given for skill in craft making and their changing significance as they pass from national and regional elites to local painters it is shown how certain key actions by local painters result from a clash between local discourses on the one hand and regional and national discourses on the other

modern art in pakistan examines interaction of space tradition and history to analyse artistic production in pakistan from the 1950s to recent times it traces the evolution of modernism in pakistan and frames it in a global context in the aftermath of

partition a masterful insight into south asian art this book will interest researchers scholars and students of south asian art and art history and pakistan in particular further it will be useful to those engaged in the fields of islamic studies museum studies and modern south asian history

this handbook is a comprehensive study of the archaeology social history and the cultural landscape of the hindu temple perhaps the most recognizable of the material forms of hinduism temples are lived dynamic spaces they are significant sites for the creation of cultural heritage both in the past and in the present drawing on historiographical surveys and in depth case studies the volume centres the material form of the hindu temple as an entry point to study its many adaptations and transformations

belonging across the bay of bengal discusses themes connecting the regions bordering the bay of bengal mainly covering the period from the mid 19th through the mid 20th centuries a crucial period of transition from colonialism to independence focusing on the notion of belonging the chapters in this collection highlight themes of ethnicity religion culture and the emergence of nationalist politics and state policies as they relate to the movement of peoples in the region while the indian ocean has been of interest to scholars for decades there has been a notable tilt towards historicizing the western half of that space often prioritizing islamic trade as the key connective glue prior to the rise of western power and the later emergence of transnational indian nationalism belonging across the bay of bengal enriches this story by drawing attention to buddhist and migrant connectivities introducing discussions of lanka burma and the straits settlements to establish the historical context of the current refugee crises playing out in these regions this is a timely and innovative volume that offers a fresh approach to indian ocean history further enriching our understanding of the current debates over minority rights and refugee problems in the region it will be of great significance to all students and scholars of indian ocean studies as well as historians of modern south and southeast asia

in the history of indian cinema the name of satyajit ray needs no introduction however what remains unvoiced is the contribution of his forebears and their tryst with indian modernity be it in art

advertising and printing technology or in nationalism feminism and cultural reform the earlier rays attempted to create forms of the modern that were uniquely indian and cosmopolitan at the same time some of the rays especially upendrakishore and his son sukumar are iconic figures in bengal but even bengali historiography is almost exclusively concerned with the family s contributions to children s literature however as this study highlights the family also played an important role in engaging with new forms of cultural modernity apart from producing literary works of enduring significance they engaged in diverse reformist endeavours the first comprehensive work in english on the pre satyajit generations the rays before satyajit is more than a collective biography of an extraordinary family it interweaves the ray saga with the larger history of indian modernity

an exploration of how the greeks reacted to and interacted with india from the third to first centuries bce when the greeks and macedonians in alexander s army reached india in 326 bce they entered a new and strange world they knew a few legends and travelers tales but their categories of thought were inadequate to encompass what they witnessed the plants were unrecognizable their properties unknown the customs of the people were various and puzzling while alexander s conquest was brief ending with his death in 323 bce the greeks would settle in the indian region for the next two centuries forging an era of productive interactions between the two cultures the greek experience of india explores the various ways that the greeks reacted to and constructed life in india during this fruitful period from observations about botany and mythology to social customs richard stoneman examines the surviving evidence of those who traveled to india most particularly he offers a full and valuable look at megasthenes ambassador of the seleucid king seleucus to chandragupta maurya and provides a detailed discussion of megasthenes s now fragmentary book indica stoneman considers the art literature and philosophy of the indo greek kingdom and how cultural influences crossed in both directions with the greeks introducing their writing coinage and sculptural and architectural forms while greek craftsmen learned to work with new materials such as ivory and stucco and to probe the ideas of buddhists and other ascetics
