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here for the first time christopher kul want brings together twenty five texts on art written by twenty philosophers covering the enlightenment to postmodernism these essays draw on continental philosophy and aesthetics the marxist intellectual tradition and psychoanalytic theory and each is accompanied by an overview and interpretation the volume features martin heidegger on van gogh s shoes and the meaning of the greek temple georges bataille on salvador dal state lugubrious game theodor w adorno on capitalism and collage walter benjamin and roland barthes on the uncanny nature of photography sigmund freud on leonardo da vinci and his interpreters jacques lacan and julia kristeva on the paintings of holbein freud s postmodern critic gilles deleuze on the visceral paintings of francis bacon and giorgio agamben on the twin traditions of the duchampian ready made and pop art kul want elucidates these texts with essays on aesthetics from hegel and nietzsche to badiou and ranci redemonstrating how philosophy adopted a new orientation toward aesthetic experience and subjectivity in the wake of kant s powerful legacy

art from a fractured past is an interdisciplinary collection examining how peruvians are representing and attempting to make sense of the violence of the 1980s and 1990s through art including drawings monuments fiction theater and cinema

this text gathers together group of contributors from the worlds of sociology musicology literature and communications to discuss how artists from jazz musicians to painters work how they coordinate their efforts how they think how they start and of course how they finish their productions

in 1877 ruskin accused whistler of flinging a pot of paint in the public s face was he right after all whistler always denied that the true function of art was to represent anything if a painting does not represent what is it other than mere paint flung in the public s face whistler s answer was simple painting is music or it is poetry georges braque half a century later echoed whistler s answer so did braque s friends apollinaire and ponge they presented their poetry as music too and as painting but meanwhile composers such as satie and stravinsky were presenting their own art music as if it transposed the values of painting or of poetry the fundamental principle of this intermedial aesthetic which bound together an extraordinary fraternity of artists in all media in paris from 1885 to 1945 was this we must always think about the value of a work of art not within the logic of its own medium but as if it transposed the value of art in another medium peter dayan traces the history of this principle how it created our very notion of great art why it declined as a vision from the 1960s and how in the 21st century it is fighting back

what is the role of aesthetic expression in responding to discrimination tragedy violence even genocide how does gender shape responses to both literal and structural violence including implicit linguistic familial and cultural violence how might writing or other works of art contribute to

healing art from trauma genocide and healing beyond rwanda explores the possibility of art as therapeutic capable of implementation by mental health practitioners crafting mental health policy in rwanda this anthology of scholarly personal and hybrid essays was inspired by scholar and activist chantal kalisa 1965 2015 at the commemoration of the nineteenth anniversary of the genocide in rwanda organized by the rwandan embassy in washington dc kalisa gave a presentation who speaks for the survivors of the genocide against tutsi kalisa devoted her energy to giving expression to those whose voices had been distorted or silenced the essays in this anthology address how the production and experience of visual dramatic cinematic and musical arts in addition to literary arts contribute to healing from the trauma of mass violence offering preliminary responses to questions like kalisa s and honoring her by continuing the dialogue in which she participated with such passion sharing the work of scholars and colleagues in genocide studies gender studies and francophone literatures

despite having become marginalized on the map of contemporary art since the wars of the 1990s the regions of former yugoslavia continue to be a hub of creative activity especially noteworthy is the strong presence of women artists scholars and activists whose deeply personal yet highly political artwork is rooted in a long legacy of female artistic agency building on existing scholarship as well as original research this book highlights how female figures through art and exhibition making writing mentorship and activism have shaped the alternative art scene in former yugoslavia and placed the region firmly on the map of the international post avantgarde using the founding of the student cultural center belgrade in 1971 as a starting point the book details the pioneering work of women in the realm of curation where they developed radical exhibition concepts and programs that furthered the development of the new art practice and embedded yugoslavia firmly on the map of the international postwar avantgardes it highlights the agency of female artists in the then novel realms of performance art video art and new media art and shows how their work has helped these disciplines to gain the impact they retain until the present day what is more it shows how female cultural workers have courageously used their work to further the discourse on gender sexuality and the female body and at a time when they saw themselves stripped of basic rights by the chauvinist nationalist regimes emerging after yugoslavia s breakup formed a strong artistic and activist opposition highlighting the role of women in the diversification of the ex yugoslavia states and its highly unique cultural and political landscape this book addresses the noticeable gap in art historical scholarship that exists not only around yugoslavia and its successor states but especially on its female representatives

armor and weaponry were central to islamic culture not only as a means of conquest and the spread of the faith but also as symbols of status wealth and power the finest arms were made by master craftsmen working with the leading designers goldsmiths and jewelers whose work transformed utilitarian military equipment into courtly works of art this book reveals the diversity and artistic quality of one of the most important and encyclopedic collections of its kind in the west the metropolitan museum s holdings span ten centuries and include representative pieces from almost every islamic culture from spain to the caucasus the collection includes rare early works among them the oldest documented islamic sword and is rich in helmets and body armor decorated with calligraphy and arabesques that were worn in iran and anatolia in the late fifteenth century other masterpieces include a jeweled short sword yatagan with a blade of watered steel that comes from the court of slleyman the magnificent a seventeenth century gold inlaid armor associated with shah jahan and two gold inlaid flintlock firearms belonging to the guard of tipu sultan of mysore presenting 126 objects each handsomely photographed and richly documented with a detailed description and discussion of its technical historical and artistic importance this overview of the met s holdings is supplemented by an introductory essay on the formation of the collection and appendixes on iconography and on turkman style armor

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
