bigger thomas has grown up in chicago s slums reckless angry and adrift a respectable job with the affluent dalton family provides hope but sets him on course for a catastrophic collision between his world and theirs hunted by citizen and police alike and baited by prejudiced officials bigger finds himself the cause célèbre in an ever narrowing endgame first published in 1940 native son shocked readers with its candid depiction of violence and confrontation of racial stereotypes it went on to make richard wright the first bestselling black writer in america in addition to being a masterpiece a great american novel guardian the most important and celebrated novel of negro life to have appeared in america james baldwin with an afterword by gary younge

Richard Wright's *Native Son* (1940) is one of the most violent and revolutionary works in the American canon. Controversial and compelling, its account of crime and racism remains the source of profound disagreement both within African American culture and throughout the world. This guide to Wright's provocative novel offers an accessible introduction to the text and contexts of *Native Son*: a critical history surveying the many interpretations of the text from publication to the present; a selection of reprinted critical essays on *Native Son* by James Baldwin, Hazel Rowley, Antony Dawahare, Claire Eby, and James Smethurst, providing a range of perspectives on the novel and extending the coverage of key critical approaches identified in the survey section; a chronology to help place the novel in its historical context; suggestions for further reading; part of the Routledge Guides to Literature series. This volume is essential reading for all those beginning detailed study of *Native Son* and seeking not only a guide to the novel but a way through the wealth of contextual and critical material that surrounds Wright's text.

Riis, *Como vive la otra mitad*, Langston Hughes, *Oscuridad en España*, and Zora Neale Hurston, *Mi gente, mi gente*, and the co-editor of *The Impact of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms 1982-2002: European Perspectives*. She has been the recipient of numerous grants and scholarships, among which are the Fulbright Research Grant and several scholarships granted by the Canadian government in the framework of the Foreign Affairs Faculty Enrichment Program.

The Communist International's popular front campaign of the 1930s brought to the fore ideas that resonated in Chicago's African American community. Indeed, the popular front not only connected to the Black experience of the era but outlasted its Communist Party affiliation to serve as both model and inspiration for a postwar cultural insurrection led by African Americans. With a new preface, Bill V. Mullen updates his dynamic reappraisal of a critical moment in American cultural history. Mullen's study includes reassessments of the politics of Richard Wright's critical reputation and a provocative reading of class struggle in Gwendolyn Brooks's *A Street in Bronzeville*. He also takes an in-depth look at the institutions that comprised Chicago's Black popular front: the *Chicago Defender*, the period's leading Black newspaper; *Negro Story*, the first magazine devoted to publishing short stories by and about African Americans; and the WPA-sponsored South Side Community Art Center.

The central thesis of Lawrence Hogue's book is that criticism of African American literature has left out of account the way in which ideological pressures dictate the canon. This fresh approach to the study of the social, ideological, and political dynamics of the African American literary text in the twentieth century, based on the Foucauldian concept of literature as social institution, examines the universalization that power effects: how literary texts are appropriated to meet ideological concerns and needs, and the continued oppression of dissenting voices. Hogue presents an illuminating discussion of the publication and review history of major and neglected texts. He illustrates the acceptance of

texts as exotica as sociological documents or as carriers of sufficient literary conventions to receive approbation although the sixties movement allowed the text to move to the periphery of the dominant ideology providing some new myths about the afro american historical past this marginal position was subsequently sabotaged co opted or appropriated afros became a fad presidents gave the soul handshake the hip talking black was dressing one style and talking another this study includes extended discussion of four works ernest j gaines s the autobiography of miss jane pittman alice walker s the third life of grange copeland albert murray s train whistle guitar and toni morrison s sula hogue assesses the informing worldviews of each and the extent and nature of their acceptance by the dominant american cultural apparatus

americans often associate travel with luxury a cosmopolitan lifestyle and relaxation they travel to get away from it all most fail to consider that modern american travel began in the straitened circumstances of the 1930s when president franklin d roosevelt encouraged citizens to tour the united states so as to stimulate the economy the federal writers project composed guidebooks for each state and tourism became a form of national solidarity after world war ii the western frontier of self reinvention and spatial expansion opened up through the explosion of the global travel industry the global frontier shows that a variety of postwar literary travelers sought personal freedom and cultural enrichment outside their nation s borders including black female and queer writers but the price of incorporation into a transnational leisure class was complicity in postwar american imperialism and the rejection of 1930s social commitments eric strand argues that capitalist globalization has enabled creative expression for marginalized identities and that present day humanists are the descendants of writers such as william s burroughs saul bellow richard wright and elizabeth bishop yet this personal liberation has accompanied a vast growth of social inequality which can only be addressed by reorienting toward progressive nationalism and an activist state

some of the most influential and interesting people in the world are fictional sherlock holmes huck finn pinocchio anna karenina genji and superman to name a few may not have walked the earth or flown in superman s case but they certainly stride through our lives they influence us personally as childhood friends catalysts to our dreams or even fantasy lovers peruvian author and presidential candidate mario vargas llosa for one confessed to a lifelong passion for flaubert s madame bovary characters can change the world witness the impact of solzhenitsyn s ivan denisovich in exposing the conditions of the soviet gulag or harriet becher stowe s uncle tom in arousing anti slavery feeling in america words such as quixotic oedipal and herculean show how fictional characters permeate our language this list of the fictional 100 ranks the most influential fictional persons in world literature and legend from all time periods and from all over the world ranging from shakespeare s hamlet 1 to toni morrison s beloved 100 by tracing characters varied incarnations in literature art music and film we gain a sense of their shape shifting potential in the culture at large although not of flesh and blood fictional characters have a life and history of their own meet these diverse and fascinating people from the brash hercules to the troubled holden caulfield from the menacing plots of medea to the misguided schemes of don quixote the fictional 100 runs the gamut of heroes and villains young and old saints and sinners ponder them fall in love with them learn from their stories the varieties of human experience let them live in you

the rediscovery of zora neale hurston s *Their Eyes Were Watching God* first published in 1937 but subsequently out of print for decades marks one of the most dramatic chapters in african american literature and women s studies its popularity owes much to the lyricism of the prose the pitch perfect rendition of black vernacular english and the memorable characters most notably janie crawford collecting the most widely cited and influential essays published on hurston s classic novel over the last quarter

century this casebook presents contesting viewpoints by hazel carby henry louis gates jr barbara johnson carla kaplan daphne lamothe mary helen washington and sherley anne williams the volume also includes a statement hurston submitted to a reference book on twentieth century authors in 1942 as it records the major debates the novel has sparked on issues of language and identity feminism and racial politics a casebook affirms the classic status of the novel and charts new directions for future critics
