School Days Chemin Decole

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school days chemin d ecole is a captivating narrative based on patrick chamoiseau s childhood in fort de france martinique it is a revelatory account of the colonial world that shaped one of the liveliest and most creative voices in french and caribbean literature today through the eyes of

the boy chamoiseau we meet his severe francophile teacher a man intent upon banishing all remnants of creole from his students speech this domineering man is succeeded by an equally autocratic teacher an africanist and proponent of negritude along the way we are also introduced to big bellybutton the class scapegoat whose tales of creole heroes and heroines magic zombies and fantastic animals provide a fertile contrast to the imported french fairy tales told in school in prose punctuated by creolisms and ribald humor chamoiseau infuses the universal terrors joys and disappointments of a child s early school days with the unique experiences of a creole boy forced to confront the dominant culture in a colonial school school days mixes understanding with laughter knowledge with entertainment in ways that will fascinate and delight readers of all ages

this volume examines the ways that writers from the caribbean africa and the u s theorize and employ postcolonial memory in ways that expose or challenge colonial narratives of the past and shows how memory assumes particular forms and values in post colonial contexts in twenty and twenty first century works the problem of contested memory and colonial history continues to be an urgent and timely issue as colonial history has served to crush erase and manipulate collective and individual memories indeed the most powerful mechanism of colonial discourse is that which alters and silences local histories and even individuals memories in service to colonial authority johnson and brezault work to contextualize the politics of writing memory in the shadow of colonial history creating a collection that pioneers a postcolonial turn in cultural memory studies suitable for scholars interested in cultural memory postcolonial francophone and ethnic studies includes a foreword by marianne hirsch

in recent years schools have started introducing more inclusive syllabi emphasizing the works and ideas of previously overlooked or underrepresented writers readers of all ages can now explore the rich contributions of writers from around the world these writers have various backgrounds and unlike most writers from the u s or the united kingdom information on them in english can be difficult to find encyclopedia of world writers 1800 to the present covers the most important writers outside of the u s britain and ireland since 1800 more than 330 insightful a to z entries profile novelists poets dramatists and short story writers whose works are anthologized in textbooks or assigned in high school english classes entries range in length from 200 to 1 000 words each and include a biographical sketch synopses of major works and a brief bibliography dozens of entries are new to this edition and many existing entries have been updated and significantly expanded with new critical analysis sections coverage

includes chinua achebe margaret atwood roberto bolaño albert camus khalid hosseini victor hugo mohammad iqbal franz kafka stieg larsson mario vargas llosa naghib mahfouz gabriel garcía márquez kenzaburo oe marcel proust leo tolstoy emile zola and more

this book explores a major modern turn in francophone caribbean literature towards récits d enfance narratives of childhood and asks why this occurred post 1990

this edited volume takes an interdisciplinary approach to the question of how identities are negotiated and a sense of belonging established in a world of increasing migration and diversity transcending field specific approaches and differences in foci the authors investigate how identity is constructed and mediated in face to face interactions in real time and fictional writing how writers use narratives to express their reorientation and their identity negotiation in a new homeland and how material objects convey layered meaning to identity and belonging this engagement with spoken written and material mediation of identity resonates with recent sociolinguistic investigations on how language is connected to and intersects with embodiment materiality and time the volume will be of interest to students and scholars of globalisation and migration studies sociolinguistics and narrative analysis anthropology and cultural studies

the first volume of paths to contemporary french literature offered a critical panorama of over fifty french writers and poets with this second volume john taylor an american writer and critic who has lived in france for the past thirty years continues this ambitious and critically acclaimed project praised for his independence curiosity intimate knowledge of european literature and his sharp reader s eye john taylor is a writer critic who is naturally skeptical of literary fashions overnight reputations and readymade academic categories charting the paths that have lead to the most serious and stimulating contemporary french writing he casts light on several neglected postwar french authors all the while highlighting genuine mentors and invigorating newcomers some names patrick chamoiseau pascal quignard jean philippe toussaint jean rouaud francis ponge aime cesaire marguerite yourcenar j m g le clezio may be familiar to the discriminating and inquisitive american reader but their work is incisively re evaluated here the book also includes a moving remembrance of nathalie sarraute and an evocation of the author s meetings with julien gracq other writers in this second volume are equally deserving authors whose work is highly respected by their peers in france yet little known in english

speaking countries taylor s pioneering elucidations in this respect are particularly valuable this second volume also examines a number of non french originally non french speaking writers such as gherasim luca petr kral armen lubin venus ghoura khata piotr rawicz as well as samuel beckett who chose french as their literary idiom taylor is in a perfect position to understand their motivations struggles and goals in a day and age when so little is known in english speaking countries about foreign literature and when so little is translated the two volumes of paths to contemporary french literature are absorb

rewriting the return to africa voices of francophone caribbean women writers examines the ways guadeloupean women writers maryse condé simone schwarz bart and myriam warner vieyra demystify the theme of the return to africa as opposed to the masculinist version by négritude male writers from the 1930s to 1960s négritude a cultural and literary movement drew much of its strength from the idea of a mythical or cultural reconnection with the african past allegorized as a mother figure in contrast these women writers of the post colonial era who are to large extent heirs of négritude differ sharply from their male counterparts in their representation of africa in their novels the continent is not represented as a propitious mother figure but a disappointing father figure this study argues that these women writers subversion of the metaphorical figure of africa and its transformation is tied to their gender the women novelists are indeed critical of a female allegorization of the land that is reminiscent of a colonial or nationalist project and a simplistic representation of motherhood that does not reflect the complexities of the diaspora s relation to origins and identity unlike the primary male writers of the négritude movement they carefully gendered the notion of return by choosing female protagonists who made their way back to the motherland in search of identity i argue that writing is a more suitable space for the female subject seeking identity because it allows her to have a voice and become subject rather than object as that was the case with the négritude writers the women writers shattering of the image of mother africa and subsequently that of father africa highlights the complex relationship between africa and the diaspora from a female point of view it shifts the identity quest of the characters towards the caribbean which emerges as the real problematic mother a multi faceted fragmented figure that reflects the constitutive clash that occurred in the archipelago between europe africa and the americas where the issues of race gender class culture ethnicity history and language are very complex

over the second half of the twentieth century a substantial flow of writing emerged from the french held caribbean much of this work is both theoretically knowing and poetically potent and has attracted international attention to the literary resonances of the uniquely complex geo historical situation of the caribbean and indeed of the americas in general much of its passion pertinence and appeal inheres in its approach to time and to space an approach still reverberating with the shock of displacement and its various after tremors an exploded sense of diversity radical relativization the profound expropriations of enslavement colonial erosion through readings of high profile as well as lesser known writing this book tracks some of the more striking tensions and tropisms at work in the french caribbean imagination of space and time and their intersection it studies generic interplay textual palimpseste narrative structure and other dynamics of writing that realize and manipulate the intersections of time and space history and memory writing and rewriting voice and text referential space and inter textual space as well as cultural theory and literary practice identity and difference place and displacement in this way it probes both the strains and the stresses and also the insights and gravitations that make for the particular french caribbean timbre of this volume of writing this specific vibration while illuminating caribbean new world and post colonial thinking in general also encourages wider reflection on global resonances of displacement and dislocation and on more general issues such as the role of writing and of narrative in particular in the confrontation of absence and presence loss and desire distance and diversity this book locates the problematic of time space in relation to historiographical geo cultural and phenomenological thinking and it also takes account of the detonation of critical interest in what is broadly termed post colonial writing its fundamental concern however is to show how a particular corpus of writing has in the space of half a century and from a bracing position of hyper relationality responded imaginatively and poetically to the challenge of envisioning place and of relating space to time

the francophone caribbean boasts a trove of literary gems distinguished by innovative elegant writing and thought provoking questions of history and identity this exciting body of work demands scholarly attention its authors treat the traumatic legacies of shared and personal histories pervading caribbean experience in striking ways delineating a path towards reconciliation and healing the creation of diverse personal narratives encompassing autobiography autofiction heavily autobiographical fiction travel writing and reflective essay remains characteristic of many caribbean writers and offers poignant illustrations of the complex interchange between shared and personal pasts and how they affect individual

lives through their historically informed autobiography the authors in this study maryse condé gisèle pineau patrick chamoiseau edwidge danticat and dany laferrière offer compelling insights into confronting coming to terms with and reconciling their past the employment of personal narratives as the vehicle to carry out this investigation points to a tension evident in these writers reflections which constantly move between the collective and the personal as an inescapably complex network their past extends beyond the notion of a single private life these contemporary authors from martinique guadeloupe and haiti intertwine their personal memories with reflections on the histories of their homelands and on the european and north american countries they adopt through choice or necessity they reveal a multitude of deep connections that illuminate distinct francophone caribbean experiences

a profoundly unsettling story of a plantation slave s desperate escape into a rainforest beyond human control with his master and a ferocious dog on his heels this flight to freedom takes them on a journey that will transform them all as the overwhelming physical presence of the forest and its dense primeval wilderness reshapes reality and time itself in the darkness the old man grapples with the spirits of all those who have gone before him the knowledge that the past is always with us and the injustice that can cry out from beyond the grave from a prix goncourt writer hailed by milan kundera as the heir of joyce and kafka the old slave and the mastiff fearlessly portrays the demonic cruelties of the slave trade and its human costs a wise loving tribute to the creole culture of martinique and a vividly told journey into the heart of caribbean history and human endurance

him slave old man is a cloudburst of a novel swift and compressed but every page pulses blood warm the prose is so electrifyingly synesthetic that on more than one occasion i found myself stopping to rub my eyes in disbelief parul sehgal the new york times shortlisted for the national book critics circle award for fiction patrick chamoiseau s slave old man was published to accolades in hardcover in a brilliant translation by linda coverdale winning the french american foundation translation prize and chosen as a publishers weeklybest book of 2018 now in paperback slave old man is a gripping profoundly unsettling story of an elderly enslaved person s daring escape into the wild from a plantation in martinique with his enslaver and a fearsome hound on his heels we follow them into a lush rain forest where nature is beyond all human control sinister yet entrancing and even exhilarating because the old man s flight to freedom will transform them all in truly astonishing even otherworldly ways as the overwhelming physical presence of the forest reshapes reality and time itself chamoiseau s exquisitely rendered new novel is an adventure for all time one that fearlessly portrays the demonic cruelties of the slave trade and its human costs in vivid sometimes hallucinatory prose offering a loving and mischievous tribute to the creole culture of early nineteenth century martinique this novel takes us on a unique and moving journey into the heart of caribbean history

very refreshing in the understanding of caribbean literature succeeds in blending close readings of specific texts with a constant awareness of the larger picture from a theoretical complexity that calls on glissant fanon ngugi benito rojo among others this profoundly human exploration of autofiction and advocacy in francophone caribbean literature study does not succumb to the temptation of theory that is she does not demand texts illustrate a rigid theoretical frame the reverse is true throughout the study cilas kemedjio university of rochester larrier breaks new ground in analyzing first person narratives by five francophone caribbean writers joseph zobel patrick chamoiseau gisele pineau edwidge danticat and maryse conde that manifest distinctive interaction among narrators protagonists characters and readers through a layering of voices languages time sources and identities employing the martinican combat dance danmye as a trope the author argues that these narratives can be read as testimony to the legacy of slavery colonialism and patriarchy that denied caribbean people their subjectivity in chapters devoted to zobel chamoiseau pineau danticat and conde who come from martinique guadeloupe and haiti larrier probes the presence construction and strategy of the first person narrator which sometimes shifts within the text itself providing a perspective different from european travel literature these texts

deliberately position the i as a witness and or performer who articulates experiences ignored or misinterpreted by sojourners more widely circulated chronicles while not purporting to speak for others the i is concerned with transmitting what he or she saw heard experienced or endured therefore disrupting conventional representations of the francophone caribbean moreover in modeling authenticity and agency autofiction is also a form of advocacy

this book showcases new and expansive possibilities for africana studies scholarship by collecting works across disciplines that push the boundaries of the discipline into topics both broader and more specific than traditionally approached in philosophy literature music political science and more

ecocriticism is a critical approach that focuses on the representation in literature of the non human elements of the natural world a method of inquiry that has been largely limited to literature written in english the aim of ecocritical approaches to literature in french is twofold to introduce ecocriticism to scholars of french language literature and to open ecocriticism to the vision and voices of french literature the chapters look at work not only from france but also from north america the caribbean and africa the discussions include fiction poetry film and pedagogy the goal of the collection is to demonstrate not only the applicability of ecocritical inquiry to literature in french but to demonstrate the possibilities of ecocritical theory on the study of french literature and also for ecocriticism itself this collection will be a useful resource both for scholars of french language literature and also for ecocritics who may have had only limited contact with literatures in languages other than english

michele praeger seeks an answer by bringing the caribbean discourses of french traditional criticism and american social sciences particularly history and psychoanalysis into conversation with the imaginings of the caribbean in the form of fiction by edouard glissant patrick chamoiseau raphael confiant maryse conde michele lacrosil and suzanne cesaire

to see the wizard politics and the literature of childhood takes its central premise as the title indicates from I frank baum s the wonderful wizard of oz upon their return to the emerald city after killing the wicked witch of the west the task the wizard assigned them dorothy the tin woodman scarecrow and lion learn that the wizard is a humbug merely a man from nebraska manipulating them and the citizens of both the emerald city and of oz from behind a screen yet they all continue to believe in the powers they know he does not have still insisting he grant their wishes the image of the man behind the screen and the reader's continued pursuit of the wizard is a powerful one that has at its core an issue central to the study of children's literature the relationship between the adult writer and the child reader as jack zipes perry nodelman daniel hade jacqueline rose and many others point out before the literature for children and young adults actually reaches these intended readers it has been mediated by many and diverse cultural social political psychological and economic forces these forces occasionally work purposefully in an attempt to consciously socialize or empower training the reader into a particular identity or way of viewing the world by one who considers him or herself an advocate for children obviously these wizards acting in literature can be the writers themselves but they can also be the publishers corporations school boards teachers librarians literary critics and parents and these advocates can be conservative progressive or any gradation in between it is the purpose of this volume to interrogate the politics and the political powers at work in literature for children and young adults childhood is an important site of political debate and children often the victims or beneficiaries of adult uses of power one would be hard pressed to find a category of literature more contested than that written for children and adolescents peter hunt writes in his introduction to understanding children's literature that children's books are overtly important educationally and commercially with consequences across the culture from language to politics most adults and almost certainly the vast majority in positions of power and influence read children s books as children and it is inconceivable that the ideologies permeating those books had no influence on their development if there were a question about the central position literature for children and young adults has in political contests one needs to look no further than the myriad struggles surrounding censorship mark i west observes for instance throughout the history of children's literature the people who have tried to censor children's books for all their ideological differences share a rather romantic view about the power of books they believe or at least they profess to believe that books are such a major influence in the formation of children's values and attitudes that adults need to monitor every word that children read because childhood and young adulthood are

the sites of political debate for issues ranging from civil rights and racism to the construction and definition of the family indoctrinating children into or subverting national and religious ideologies the literature of childhood bears consciously political analysis asking how socialization works how children and young adults learn of social cultural and political expectations as well as how literature can propose means of fighting those structures to see the wizard politics and the literature of childhood intends to offer analysis of the political content and context of literature written for and about children and young adults the essays included in to see the wizard analyze nineteenth and twentieth century literature from america britain australia the caribbean and sri lanka that is for and about children and adolescents the essays address issues of racial and national identity and representation poverty and class mobility gender sexuality and power and the uses of literature in the healing of trauma and the construction of an authentic self

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
