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dystopian narrative is a product of the social ferment of the twentieth century a hundred years of war famine disease state terror genocide ecocide and the depletion of humanity through the buying and selling of everyday life provided fertile ground for this fictive underside of the utopian imagination from the classical works by e m forster yevgeny zamyatin aldous huxley george orwell and margaret atwood through the new maps of hell in postwar science fiction and most recently in the dystopian turn of the 1980s and 1990s this narrative machine has produced challenging cognitive maps of the given historical situation by way of imaginary societies which are even worse than those that lie outside their authors and readers doors in scraps of the untainted sky tom moylan offers a thorough investigation of the history and aesthetics of dystopia to situate his study moylan sets out the methodological paradigm that developed within the interdisciplinary fields of science fiction studies and utopian studies as they grow out of the oppositional political culture of the 1960 and 1970s the context that produced the project of cultural studies itself he then presents a thorough account of the textual structure and formal operations of the dystopian text from there he focuses on the new science fictional dystopias that emerged in the context of the economic

political and cultural convulsions of the 1980s and 1990s and he examines in detail three of these new critical dystopias kim stanley robinson s the gold coast octavia butler s the parable of the sower and marge piercy s he she and it with its detailed documented and yet accessible presentation scraps of the untainted sky will be of interest to established scholars as well as students and general readers who are seeking an in depth introduction to this important area of cultural production

provides an overview of ways that utopian thinking has shaped american culture focusing on the need to remake imperial usa

theology fantasy and the imagination offers analyses of the theological philosophical and religious imagination found in fantasy literature the theological imagination and table top games part i offers an invocation to the study through a theological reflection of the old magic part ii analyzes classical christian fantasy ranging from dogmatic theological reflection on the fantastic imagination to analyses of c s lewis and j r r tolkien part iii analyzes the post christian turn in fantasy after about 1960 through today featuring methodological theological and philosophical essays that reflect a movement beyond christianity in the fantasy literature and writings of rabbi shagar ursula le guin terry pratchett robert jordan and david eddings and brandon sanderson and orson scott card part iv closes with two analyses of the religious and philosophical dimensions of table top games including dungeons and dragons and magic the gathering theology fantasy and the imagination offers astute analyses of how theological fantasy actually is by articulating the religious philosophical and theological dimensions of the fantastic imagination

since the 1950s men and women around the world have claimed to have had contact with human like visitors from space this book explores how the contactee subculture has critiqued political social and cultural trends in the united states europe and elsewhere not merely quaint relics of the 1950s atomic age contactees have continued their messages of transformation into the 21st century regardless of whether these alleged contacts took the form of physical meetings or channeled paranormal psychic communications or whether they actually happened at all contactees have provided a consistently relevant source of commentary on this world and beyond

what do literary dystopias reflect about the times in blast corrupt dismantle erase contributors address this amorphous but pervasive genre using diverse critical methodologies to examine how north america is conveyed or portrayed in a perceived age of crisis accelerated uncertainty and political volatility drawing from contemporary novels such as cormac mccarthy s the road neil gaiman s american gods and the work of margaret atwood and william gibson to name a few this book examines dystopian literature produced by north american authors between the signing of nafta 1994 and the tenth anniversary of 9 11 2011 as the texts illustrate awareness of and deep concern about perceived vulnerabilities ends of water oil food capitalism empires stable climates ways of life non human species and entire human civilizations have become central to public discourseover the same period by asking questions such as what are the distinctive qualities of post nafta north american dystopian literature and what does this literature reflect about the tensions and contradictions of the inchoate continental community of north america blast corrupt dismantle erase serves to resituate dystopian writing within a particular geo social setting and introduce a productive means to understand both north american dystopian writing and its relevant engagements

with a restricted mapped reality

a dream of a better world is a powerful human force that inspires activists artists and citizens alike in this book tom moylan one of the pioneering scholars of contemporary utopian studies explores the utopian process in its individual and collective trajectory from dream to realization drawing on theorists such as fredric jameson donna haraway and alain badiou and science fiction writers such as kim stanley robinson and china miéville becoming utopian develops its argument for sociopolitical action through studies that range from liberation theology ecological activism and radical pedagogy to the radical movements of 1968 throughout moylan speaks to the urgent need to confront and transform the global environmental economic political and cultural crises of our time

literary critics and scholars have written extensively on the demise of the utopian spirit in the modern novel what has often been overlooked is the emergence of a new hybrid subgenre particularly in science fiction and fantasy which incorporates utopian strategies within the dystopian narrative particularly in the feminist dystopias of the 1980s and 1990s the author names this new subgenre transgressive utopian dystopias suzette haden elgin s native tongue trilogy suzy mckee charna s holdfast series and margaret atwood s the handmaid s tale are thoroughly analyzed within the context of this this new subgenre of transgressive utopian dystopias analysis focuses particularly on how these works cover the interrelated categories of gender race and class along with their relationship to classic literary dualism and the dystopian narrative without completely dissolving the dualistic order the feminist dystopias studied
