shenkottai sri avudai akkal a remarkable eighteenth century woman saint from tamil nadu was a self realised advaitin who sang passionately about the ecstasy of spiritual union with the absolute a desolate and stigmatised brahmin child widow she was initiated into vedanta by the great master tiruvisainallur shridhara venkatesa ayyawal her songs a radical elision of the metaphysical sublime and personal devotion are narrated through existential tropes sourced from daily life and also offer a powerful

critique of the oppressive orthodox socio religious practices of that period composed in simple colloquial tamil and bringing hope and solace to women in general and widows in particular for almost three centuries these songs by avudai akkal were preserved within the oral tradition by brahmin women of tirunellveli district who sang them on all occasions the songs were documented in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries and have appeared in many tamil publications they appear in english translation for the first time in this book each song is accompanied by annotations and themed essays published by zubaan

gadamer s truth and method a polyphonic commentary offers a fresh look at gadamer s magnum opus truth and method which was first published in german in 1960 translated into english in 1975 and is widely recognized as a ground breaking text of philosophical hermeneutics the volume features essays from fourteen scholars both established and rising stars each of which cover a portion of truth and method following the order of the text itself the result is a robust historically and thematically rich polyphonic reading of the text as a whole valuable both for scholarship and teaching

in adorno s theory of philosophical and aesthetic truth owen hulatt undertakes an original reading of theodor w adorno s epistemology and its material underpinnings deepening our understanding of his theories of truth art and the nonidentical hulatt s novel interpretation casts adorno s theory of philosophical and aesthetic truth as substantially unified supporting the thinker s claim that both philosophy and art are capable of being true for adorno truth is produced when rhetorical texture combines with cognitive performance leading to the breakdown of concepts that mediate the experience of the consciousness both philosophy and art manifest these features although philosophy enacts these conceptual issues directly while art does so obliquely hulatt builds a robust argument for adorno s claim that concepts ineluctably misconstrue their objects he also puts the still influential thinker into conversation with hegel husserl frazer sohn rethel benjamin strawson dahlhaus habermas and caillois among many others

political theorists jeremy elkins and andrew norris observe that american political culture is deeply ambivalent about truth on the one hand voices on both the left and right make confident appeals to the truth of claims about the status of the market in public life and the role of scientific evidence and argument in public life human rights and even religion on the other hand there is considerable anxiety that such appeals threaten individualism and political plurality this anxiety elkins and norris contend

has perhaps been greatest in the humanities and in political theory where many have responded by either rejecting or neglecting the whole topic of truth the essays in this volume question whether democratic politics requires discussion of truth and if so how truth should matter to democratic politics while individual essays approach the subject from different angles the volume as a whole suggests that the character of our politics depends in part on what kinds of truthful inquiries it promotes and how it deals with various kinds of disputes about truth the contributors to the volume including prominent political and legal theorists philosophers and intellectual historians argue that these are important political and not merely theoretical questions

when oscar wilde was convicted of gross indecency in 1895 a reporter for the national observer wrote that there was not a man or a woman in the english speaking world possessed of the treasure of a wholesome mind who is not under a deep debt of gratitude to the marquis of queensberry for destroying the high priest of the decadents but reports of the death of decadence were greatly exaggerated

and today more than one hundred years after the famous trial and at the beginning of a new millennium the phenomenon of decadence continues to be a significant cultural force indeed decadence in the nineteenth century and in our own period has been a concept whose analysis yields a broad set of associations in perennial decay emily apter charles bernheimer sylvia molloy michael riffaterre barbara spackman marc weiner and others extend the critical field of decadence beyond the traditional themes of morbidity the cult of artificiality exoticism and sexual nonconformism they approach the question of decadence afresh reevaluating the continuing importance of late nineteenth century decadence for contemporary literary and cultural studies

what is narrative what is distinctive about the great literary narratives in virtue of what is a narrative fictional or non fictional in this important new book peter lamarque one of the leading philosophers of literature at work today explores these and related questions to bring new clarity and insight to debates about narrative in philosophy critical theory and narratology he highlights opacity as a feature of literary narratives and examines the implications for our understanding of fictional worlds and fictional characters throughout he challenges received views about narrative questioning the indispensability of narrative in an individual s self conception and the importance of both truth and emotion as measures of literary greatness he reflects on the non fiction novel arguing that it does not weaken the distinction between fiction and no fiction the book offers a compelling and original account of these and other issues making a critical contribution to topical and wide ranging debates

writing in the fourth century b c in an athens that had suffered a humiliating defeat in the peloponnesian war plato formulated questions that have haunted the moral religious and political imagination of the west for more than 2 000 years what is virtue how should we love what constitutes a good society is there a soul that outlasts the body and a truth that transcends appearance what do we know and how do we know it plato s inquiries were all the more resonant because he couched them in the form of dramatic and often highly comic dialogues whose principal personage was the ironic teasing and relentlessly searching philosopher socrates in this splendid collection scott buchanan brings together the most important of plato s dialogues including protagoras the symposium with its barbed conjectures about the relation between love and madness phaedo and the republic his monumental work of political philosophy buchanan s learned and engaging introduction allows us to see plato both as a commentator on his society and as a shaper of the societies that followed who bequeathed to us a hunger for the ideal as well as a redeeming habit of humane skepticism
