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how is watching a movie similar to dreaming what goes on in our minds when we become absorbed in a movie how does looking into a movie screen allow us to experience the thoughts and feelings of a movie

s characters these and related questions are at the heart of the power of movies a thoughtful invigorating and remarkably accessible book about a phenomenon seemingly beyond reach of our understanding colin mcginn an ingenious philosopher who thinks like a laser and writes like a dream according to steven pinker enhances our understanding of both movies and ourselves in this book of rare and refreshing insight

the latent symbolism in film imagery can be psychoanalyzed just like the imagery in dreams this work applies to film the psychoanalytic techniques of sigmund freud erik erikson carl jung alfred adler joseph campbell otto rank and rollo may providing a fundamental understanding of film symbols and structure it offers a comprehensive and eclectic approach to film analysis using a broad variety of theories and examples from both classic and contemporary movies from dracula 1930 to american beauty 1999 the final chapter applies all the previously discussed techniques to one film malcolm x 1992 the work boasts a filmography and bibliography and is illustrated with film stills instructors considering this book for use in a course may request an examination copy here

this publication is a major evaluation of the 1970s american cinema including cult film directors such as bogdanovich altman and peckinpah

this study considers parallel issues in revenge tragedies of the early seventeenth century and violent cinema of the last thirty years it offers a series of provocative explorations of death revenge and justice and gender and violence what happens when we connect the white devil with basic instinct the changeling or titus andronicus with straw dogs doctor faustus with se7en taxi driver with the spanish tragedy appealing to those with an interest in either drama or film written in an engaging style the book also reconsiders the high popular culture divide and reflects on the enduring significance of the revenge motif in western culture over the past four hundred years particularly in the post 9 11 context

this collection focuses on 1970s films from a variety of countries and from the marginal to the mainstream which by tackling various difficult subjects have proved to be controversial in one way or another it is not an uncritical celebration of the shocking and the subversive but an attempt to understand why this decade produced films which many found shocking and what it was that made them shocking to certain audiences to this end it includes not only films that shocked the conventionally minded such as hard core pornography but also those that outraged liberal opinion for example death wish and dirty harry the book does not simply cast a critical light on a series of controversial films which have been variously maligned misinterpreted or just plain ignored but also assesses how their production values narrative features and critical receptions can be linked to the wider historical and social forces that were dominant during this decade furthermore it explores how these films resonate in our own historical moment replete as it is with shocks of all kinds

in when the movies mattered jonathan kirshner and jon lewis gather a remarkable collection of authors to revisit the unique era in american cinema that was new hollywood ten eminent contributors some of whom wrote about the new hollywood movement as it unfolded across the 1960s and 1970s assess the convergence of film industry developments and momentous social and political changes that created a new type of commercial film that reflected those revolutionary influences in american life even as new hollywood first took shape film industry insiders and commentators alike realized its significance at the time pauline kael compared the new hollywood to the tangled bitter flowering of american letters in the 1850s and david thomson dubbed the era the decade when movies mattered thomson s words provide the impetus for this volume in which a cohort of seasoned film critics and scholars who came of age watching the movies of this era reflect upon and reconsider this golden age in american filmmaking contributors molly haskell heather hendershot j hoberman george kouvaros phillip lopate robert pippin david sterritt david thomson

in film blackness michael boyce gillespie shifts the ways we think about black film treating it not as a category a genre or strictly a representation of the black experience but as a visual negotiation

between film as art and the discursivity of race gillespie challenges expectations that black film can or should represent the reality of black life or provide answers to social problems instead he frames black film alongside literature music art photography and new media treating it as an interdisciplinary form that enacts black visual and expressive culture gillespie discusses the racial grotesque in ralph bakshi s coonskin 1975 black performativity in wendell b harris jr s chameleon street 1989 blackness and noir in bill duke s deep cover 1992 and how place and desire impact blackness in barry jenkins s medicine for melancholy 2008 considering how each film represents a distinct conception of the relationship between race and cinema gillespie recasts the idea of black film and poses new paradigms for genre narrative aesthetics historiography and intertextuality

examines the supreme court s unanimous 1952 decision in favor of a film exhibitor who had been denied a license to show the controversial italian film il miracolo the ruling was a watershed event in the history of film censorship ushering in a new era of mature and sophisticated american filmmaking

this book charts the changing complexion of american culture in one of the most culturally vibrant of twentieth century decades it provides a vivid account of the major cultural forms of 1960s america music and performance film and television fiction and poetry art and photography as well as influential texts trends and figures of the decade from norman mailer to susan sontag from muhammad ali s anti war protests to tom lehrer s stand up comedy from bob dylan to rachel carson and from pop art to photojournalism a chapter on new social movements demonstrates that a current of conservatism runs through even the most revolutionary movements of the 1960s and the book as a whole looks to the west and especially to the south in the making of the sixties as myth and as history

in hollywood left and right steven j ross tells a story that has escaped public attention the emergence of hollywood as a vital center of political life and the important role that movie stars have played in shaping the course of american politics ever since the film industry relocated to hollywood early in the twentieth century it has had an outsized influence on american politics through compelling larger than life figures in american cinema charlie chaplin louis b mayer edward g robinson george murphy ronald reagan harry belafonte jane fonda charlton heston warren beatty and arnold schwarzenegger hollywood left and right reveals how the film industry s engagement in politics has been longer deeper and more varied than most people would imagine as shown in alternating chapters the left and the right each gained ascendancy in tinseltown at different times from chaplin whose movies almost always displayed his leftist convictions to schwarzenegger s nearly seamless transition from action blockbusters to the california governor s mansion steven j ross traces the intersection of hollywood and political activism from the early twentieth century to the present hollywood left and right challenges the commonly held belief that hollywood has always been a bastion of liberalism the real story as ross shows in this passionate and entertaining work is far more complicated first hollywood has a longer history of conservatism than liberalism second and most surprising while the hollywood left was usually more vocal and visible the right had a greater impact on american political life capturing a senate seat murphy a governorship schwarzenegger and the ultimate achievement the presidency reagan
