this book introduces the reader to the ideas and the personality of a scholar who exerted a major influence on the course of art historical studies through his publications through the institute which bears his name and through his disciples who include some of the most eminent people in the field

the work of german cultural theorist and art historian aby warburg 1866 1929 has had a lasting effect on how we think about images this book is the first in english to focus on his last project the encyclopedic atlas of images mnemosyne begun in earnest in 1927 and left unfinished at the time of warburg s death in 1929 the atlas consisted of sixty three large wooden panels covered with black cloth on these panels warburg carefully intuitively arranged some thousand black and white photographs of classical and renaissance art objects as well as of astrological and

astronomical images ranging from ancient babylon to weimar germany here and there he also included maps manuscript pages and contemporary images taken from newspapers trying through these constellations of images to make visible the many polarities that fueled antiquity s afterlife warburg envisioned the atlas as a vital form of metaphoric thought while the nondiscursive frequently digressive character of the atlas complicates any linear narrative of its themes and contents christopher d johnson traces several thematic sequences in the panels by drawing on warburg s published and unpublished writings and by attending to warburg s cardinal idea that pathos formulas structure the west s cultural memory johnson maps numerous tensions between word and image in the atlas in addition to examining the work itself he considers the literary philosophical and intellectual historical implications of the atlas as johnson demonstrates the atlas is not simply the culmination of warburg s lifelong study of renaissance culture but the ultimate expression of his now literal now metaphoric search for syncretic solutions to the urgent problems posed by the history of art and culture

a compelling analysis of the work of art historian aby warburg and its radical implications for the study of visual images aby warburg 1866 1929 is best known as the originator of the discipline of iconology and as the founder of the institute that bears his name his followers included some of the celebrated art historians of the twentieth century such as erwin panofsky edgar wind and fritz saxl but his heirs developed for the most part a domesticated iconology based on the decipherment and interpretation of symbolic material as philippe alain michaud demonstrates in this important book warburg s project was remote from any positivist or neo kantian ambitions nourished on the work of friedrich nietzsche and jacob burckhardt warburg fashioned a critical iconology to reveal the irrationality of the image in western culture opposing the grand teleological narratives of art inaugurated by giorgio vasari warburg s method operated through historical anachronisms and discontinuities using procedures of montage collision he brought together pagan artifacts with masterpieces of florentine renaissance art the astrology of the ancient near east with the lutheran reformation mannerist festivals with the sacred dances of native americans michaud insists that for warburg the practice of art history was not only the recognition of the radical heterogeneity of objects but the discovery within the art work itself of lines of fracture contradictions tensions and the energies of magic empathy totemism and animism michaud provides us with a book that not only is about warburg but also extends his intuitions and discoveries into analyses of other categories of imagery like the daguerreotype the chronophotography of Étienne jules marey early cinema and the dances of loïe fuller this edition also includes a foreword by georges didi huberman and texts by warburg not previously translated into english chosen as one of the best art books of 2004 by the washington post and bookforum

a landmark study on aby warburg s life and work translated into english in aby warburg and anti semitism charlotte schoell glass provides an unprecedented look at the life and writings of cultural critic aby warburg through the prism of warburg s little known political views schoell glass argues provocatively based on archival research that warburg s work and teachings developed as a reaction to the growing anti semitism in germany which he saw as a threat to classical education and university scholarship translated into english for the first time aby warburg and anti semitism sheds much needed light on warburg s views on judaism and the politics of his time aby warburg scion of a well known jewish banking family in hamburg sacrificed his birthright to pursue a career as a private scholar as an independent art historian he devoted himself almost exclusively to reinterpreting the revival of antiquity within the renaissance urging other art historians to approach their work as a brand of the larger study of image making and philosophy in this study schoell glass examines warburg s most influential essays on dürer rembrandt and the sassetti chapel and his most innovative concepts the accessories of motion the pathos formula and the afterlife of antiquity to illustrate how warburg persistently showed a deep concern over a disappointing and unstable outside world within his

own work schoell glass shows how warburg attempts to make a response to anti semitism the only way he knew how despite his awareness of the diminishing societal relevance of that response from this study of warburg schoell glass produces a multilayered case study of the encounter between twentieth century politics and scholarship art historians german historians and scholars of jewish studies and cultural studies will be grateful for this volume

originally published in german italian and french these articles have been translated into english for the first time by the author the former archivist of the warburg institute london aby warburg s research and writings centred on images their origins and metamorphoses and their explanations and interpretations the articles include discussions of warburg s academic work with colleagues such as james loeb the american hellenist and philanthropist and founder of the loeb classical library and with josef strzygowski the polish austrian art historian of the vienna school of art history further articles include notes on warburg s serpent ritual lecture of 1923 his politico cultural initiative in 1914 1915 his work on caricature in particular the struwwelpeter topic and discussions on the topic of judaica the viennese art historian fritz saxl became his trusted friend and collaborator helping to gather warburg s large collection of books and photographs into the foundation of an academic institution in hamburg in the 1920s and then for a second time in london in the 1930s the warburg institute has become one of the world s leading centres of intellectual history cs 1109

justin j white explores the nature of images in ancient israel through a reconceptualization of the relationship between image and text he proposes that in ancient israel texts evoked images as a core part of their rhetoric rather than conceptualizing texts and images as ontologically or functionally distinct media he argues that both media are mixed media even while neither medium is reducible to the other in order to make this argument he focuses on the visual aspects of textual rhetoric what he terms the poetics of visuality he builds his argument across three text specific axes of visual rhetoric ekphrasis the visual imagination and material agency he makes the claim that each of these three axes are endemic to israelite literature and mutually contribute to the formation of a robust ontology of visual representation in ancient israel

there are few terms or concepts that have in the last twenty or so years rivaled collective memory for attention in the humanities and social sciences indeed use of the term has extended far beyond scholarship to the realm of politics and journalism where it has appeared in speeches at the centers of power and on the front pages of the world's leading newspapers the current efflorescence of interest in memory however is no mere passing fad it is a hallmark characteristic of our age and a crucial site for understanding our present social political and cultural conditions scholars and others in numerous fields have thus employed the concept of collective memory sociological in origin to guide their inquiries into diverse though allegedly connected phenomena nevertheless there remains a great deal of confusion about the meaning origin and implication of the term and the field of inquiry it underwrites the collective memory reader presents organizes and evaluates past work and contemporary contributions on the questions raised under the rubric of collective memory combining seminal texts hard to find classics previously untranslated references and contemporary landmarks it will serve as an essential resource for teaching and research in the field in addition in both its selections as well as in its editorial materials it suggests a novel life story for the field one that appreciates recent innovations but only against the background of a long history in addition to its major editorial introduction which outlines a useful past for contemporary memory studies the collective memory reader includes five sections precursors and classics history memory and identity power politics and contestation media and modes of transmission memory justice and the contemporary epoch comprising ninety one texts in addition to the essay introducing the entire volume a brief editorial essay introduces each of the sections while brief capsules frame each of the 91 texts

first published in 1985 german jews beyond judaism is george I mosse s sweeping exploration of german jewish secular identity across the nineteenth and twentieth centuries in germany jews were emancipated at a time when cultural education was becoming an integral part of german society they felt a powerful urge to find their jewish substance within german culture and thus craft an identity as both germans and jews mosse argues that they did so by adopting the concept of bildung the idea of intellectual and moral self cultivation combined with key enlightenment ideals of human potential individualism and the connection between knowledge and morality through aesthetics he traces how jewish artists writers and thinkers actively sought to participate in german culture through popular culture scholarship and political activity despite the eventual dissolution of german jewish dialogue due to the emergence of a virulently racist nationalism important jewish heritage emerged as a result of this attempt to integrate both identities german jews beyond judaism was in mosse s own estimation his most personal book almost a confession of faith david j sorkin s new critical introduction illustrates how mosse s life and values both shaped and exemplified his historical analysis and offers potential meanings of his intellectual legacy for the present day

an acknowledged authority on german history and memory alon confino presents in this volume an original critique of the relations between nationhood memory and history applied to the specific case of germany in ten essays three never before published and one published only in german confino offers a distinct view of german nationhood in particular and of nationhood in general as a product of collective negotiation and exchange between the many memories that exist in the nation the first group of essays centers on the period from 1871 to 1990 and explores how germans used conceptions of the local or heimat to identify what it meant to be german in a century of ideological upheavals the second group of essays comprehensively critiques and analyzes the ways laypersons and scholars use the notion of memory as a tool to understand the past arguing that the case of germany contains particular characteristics with broader implications for the way historians practice their trade germany as a culture of remembrance examines the limits and possibilities of writing history

gestural imaginaries dance and cultural theory in the early twentieth century offers a new interpretation of european modernist dance by addressing it as guiding medium in a vibrant field of gestural culture that ranged across art and philosophy taking further cornelius castoriadis s concept of the social imaginary it explores this imaginary s embodied forms close readings of dances photographs and literary texts are juxtaposed with discussions of gestural theory by thinkers including walter benjamin sigmund freud and aby warburg choreographic gesture is defined as a force of intermittency that creates a new theoretical status of dance author lucia ruprecht shows how this also bears on contemporary theory she shifts emphasis from giorgio agamben s preoccupation with gestural mediality to jacques ranci re s multiplicity of proliferating singular gestures arguing for their ethical and political relevance mobilizing dance history and movement analysis ruprecht highlights the critical impact of works by choreographers such as vaslav nijinsky jo mihaly and alexander and clotilde sakharoff she also offers choreographic readings of franz kafka and alfred d blin gestural imaginaries proposes that modernist dance conducts a gestural revolution which enacts but also exceeds the insights of past and present cultural theory it makes a case for archive based cross medial and critically informed dance studies transnational german studies and the theoretical potential of performance itself

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
