david d allyn has led a life that others can only dream about adventurer traveler sailor aviator explorer and big hearted bon vivant dave came of age while sailing around the world on the last voyage of the tall brigantine yankee with all the accompanying tales of drudgery and heat punctuated by terrifying gales tension amongst the crew members and a too close encounter with a one thousand pound bull shark then there was the time he survived emergency surgery on the ship s kitchen table an adrenaline junky dave also flew planes back in the days when you needed a helmet and goggles to do it aviators and historians will delight in his vivid accounts of flying vintage aircraft 139 different types in all as well as his stories of collecting a large fleet of famous old aircraft and establishing a fixed base operation it s still there dolphin aviation in sarasota florida and a museum these stories aren t just about boats and aircraft however they re also about people and pristine landscapes you ll visit tahiti bimini and the galapagos before tourists got there you ll meet cowboys mechanics skydivers artists deep sea divers with a death wish crazy drunks and a host of other characters who knew how to live life large a life affirming swaggering book yardarm and cockpit is one wild ride without a seat belt

challenges narrow perceptions of blackness as both an identity and lived reality to understand the diversity of what it means to be black in the us and around the world what exactly is blackness and what does it mean to be black is blackness a matter of biology or consciousness who determines who is black and who is not who s black who s not and who cares in the united states a black person has come to be defined as any person with any known black ancestry statutorily referred to as the rule of hypodescent this definition of blackness is more popularly known as the one drop rule meaning that a person with any trace of black ancestry however small or in visible cannot be considered white a method of social order that began almost immediately after the arrival of enslaved africans in america by 1910 it was the law in almost all southern states at a time

when the one drop rule functioned to protect and preserve white racial purity blackness was both a matter of biology and the law one was either black or white period has the social and political landscape changed one hundred years later one drop explores the extent to which historical definitions of race continue to shape contemporary racial identities and lived experiences of racial difference featuring the perspectives of 60 contributors representing 25 countries and combining candid narratives with striking portraiture this book provides living testimony to the diversity of blackness although contributors use varying terms to self identify they all see themselves as part of the larger racial cultural and social group generally referred to as black they have all had their identity called into question simply because they do not fit neatly into the stereotypical black box dark skin kinky hair broad nose full lips etc most have been asked what are you or the more politically correct where are you from throughout their lives it is through contributors lived experiences with and lived imaginings of black identity that we can visualize multiple possibilities for blackness

this book argues for an important shift in cultural heritage conservation away from a focus on maintaining the physical fabric of material culture toward the impact that conservation work has on people s lives in doing so it challenges the commodification of sacred objects and places by western conservation thought and attempts to decolonize conservation practice to do so the authors examine conservation activities at maori marae meeting houses located in the us germany and england and contrasts them with changes in marae conservation in new zealand a key case study is the hinemihi meeting house transported to england in the 1890s where it was treated as a curiosity by visitors to clandon park for over a century and more recently as a focal point of cultural activity for uk maori communities recent efforts to include various maori stakeholder communities in the care of this sacred structure is a key example of community based conservation that can be replicated in heritage practice around the world

indigenous education and the metaphysics of presence a worlded philosophy explores a notion of education called worldedness that sits at the core of indigenous philosophy this is the idea that any one thing is constituted by all others and is therefore educational to the extent that it is formational a suggested opposite of this indigenous philosophy is the metaphysics of presence which describes the tendency in dominant western philosophy to privilege presence over absence this book compares these competing philosophies and argues that even though the metaphysics of presence and the formational notion of education are at odds with each other they also constitute each other from an indigenous worlded philosophical viewpoint drawing on both maori and western philosophies this book demonstrates how the metaphysics of presence is both related and opposed to the indigenous notion of worldedness mika explains that presence seeks to fragment things in the world underpins how indigenous

peoples can represent things and prevents indigenous students critics and scholars from reflecting on philosophical colonisation however the metaphysics of presence from an indigenous perspective is constituted by all other things in the world and mika argues that the indigenous student and critic can re emphasise worldedness and destabilise presence through creative responses humour and speculative thinking this book concludes by positioning well being within education because education comprises acts of worldedness and presence this book will be of key interest to indigenous as well as non indigenous academics researchers and postgraduate students in the fields of philosophy of education indigenous and western philosophy political strategy and post colonial studies it will also be relevant for those who are interested in philosophies of language ontology metaphysics and knowledge
