twenty questions for a writer is structured around twenty questions most often used by writers for finding and developing their

topics this basic structure creates a versatility that sheds light ion the writing process

how do we know right from wrong do we even have moral knowledge moral epistemology studies these and related questions about our understanding of virtue and vice it is one of philosophy s perennial problems reaching back to plato aristotle aquinas locke hume and kant and has recently been the subject of intense debate as a result of findings in developmental and social psychology in this outstanding introduction to the subject aaron zimmerman covers the following key topics what is moral epistemology what are its methods including a discussion of socrates gettier and contemporary theories of knowledge skepticism about moral knowledge based on the anthropological record of deep and persistent moral disagreement including contextualism moral nihilism including debates concerning god and morality and the relation between moral knowledge and our motives and reasons to act morally epistemic moral scepticism intuitionism and the possibility of inferring ought from is discussing the views of locke hume kant ross audi thomson harman sturgeon and many others how children acquire moral concepts and become more reliable judges criticisms of those who would reduce moral knowledge to value neutral knowledge or attempt to replace moral belief with emotion throughout the book zimmerman argues that our belief in moral knowledge can survive sceptical challenges he also draws on a rich range of examples from plato s meno and dickens david copperfield to bernard madoff and saddam hussein including chapter summaries and annotated further reading at the end of each chapter moral epistemology is essential reading for all students of ethics epistemology and moral psychology

focusing on the language style and poetry of dickens novels this study breaks new ground in reading dickens novels as a unique form of poetry dickens writing disallows the statement of single unambiguous truths and shows unconscious processes burrowing within language disrupting received ideas and modes of living arguing that dickens within nineteenth century modernity sees language as always double tambling draws on a wide range of victorian texts and current critical theory to explore dickens interest

in literature and popular song and what happens in jokes in caricature in word play and punning and in naming working from dickens earliest writings to the latest deftly combining theory with close analysis of texts the book examines dickens key novels such as pickwick papers martin chuzzlewit dombey and son bleak house little dorrit great expectations and our mutual friend it considers dickens as constructing an urban poetry alert to language coming from sources beyond the individual and relating that to the dream life of characters who both can and cannot awake to fuller different consciousness drawing on walter benjamin lacan and derrida tambling shows how dickens writes a new and comic poetry of the city and that the language constitutes an unconscious and secret autobiography this volume takes dickens scholarship in exciting new directions and will be of interest to all readers of nineteenth century literary and cultural studies and more widely to all readers of literature

victorian britain offered to the globe an economic structure of unique complexity the trading nation at the heart of a great empire developed the practices of advanced capitalism currency banking investment money markets business practices and theory intellectual property legislation from which the financial systems of the contemporary world emerged cultural forms in victorian britain transacted with high capitalism in a variety of ways but literary critics interested in economics have traditionally been preoccupied either with writers hostility to industrial capitalism in terms of its shaping of class or with the development of consumerism victorian literature and finance is the first extended study to take seriously the relationships between literary forms and those more complex discourses of victorian high finance these essays move beyond the examination of literature that was merely impatient with the perceived consequences of capitalism to analyse creative relationships between culture and economic structures considering such topics as the nature of currency women and the culture of investment the profits of a modern media age the dramatization of risk on the victorian stage the practice of realism in relation to business theory the culture of speculation at the end of the century and arguments about the uncomfortable relationship between literary and financial capital victorian literature and finance sets new terms for understanding and theorizing the relationship between high finance and literary writing in the nineteenth century

a materialist theory of mind 1968 by david armstrong is one of a handful of texts that began the physicalist revolution in the philosophy of mind it is perhaps the most influential book in the field of the second half of the twentieth century in this volume a distinguished international team of philosophers examine what we still owe to armstrong s theory and how to expand it as well as looking back on how it came about the first four chapters are historical in orientation exploring how the book fits into the history of materialism in the twentieth century the chapters that follow discuss perception belief the supposed explanatory gap between the physical and the mental introspection conation causality and functionalism

in a new approach to goethe s faust i evanghelia stead extensively discusses moritz retzsch s twenty six outline prints 1816 and how their spin offs made the unfathomable play available to larger reader communities through copying and extensive distribution circuits including bespoke gifts the images amply transformed as they travelled throughout europe and overseas revealing differences between countries and cultures but also their pliability and resilience whenever remediated this interdisciplinary investigation evidences the importance of print culture throughout the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries in nations involved in competition and conflict retzsch s foundational set crucially engenders parody and inspires the stage literature and three dimensional objects well beyond common perceptions of print culture s influence this book is available in open access thanks to an institut universitaire de france iuf grant
