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this is an authoritative presentation and discussion of the most basic thematic elements universally found in folklore and literature the reference provides a detailed analysis of the most common archetypes or motifs found in the folklore of selected communities around the world each entry is written by a noted authority in the field and includes accompanying reference citations entries are keyed to the motif index of folk literature by stith thompson and grouped according to that index s scheme the reference also includes an introductory essay on the concepts of archetypes and motifs and the scholarship associated with them this is the only book in english on motifs and themes that is completely folklore oriented deals with motif numbers and is tied to the thompson motif index it includes in depth examination of such motifs as bewitching chance and fate choice of roads death or departure of the gods the double ghosts and other revenants the hero

welcome to a landscape of ancient evil with stories by masters of horror arthur machen algernon blackwood h p lovecraft m r james ramsey campbell storm constantine christopher fowler alison littlewood kim newman reggie oliver michael marshall smith karl edward wagner and more the darkness that endures beneath the earth the disquiet that lingers in the woodland surrounding a forgotten path those ancient traditions and practices that still cling to standing stone circles earthworks and abandoned buildings elaborate rituals that invoke elder gods or nature deities the restless spirits and legendary creatures that remain connected to a place or object or exist in deep wells and lonely pools of water waiting to ensnare the unwary traveler these concepts have been the archetypes of horror fiction for decades but in recent years they have been given a name folk horror this type of storytelling has existed for more than a century authors arthur machen algernon blackwood h p lovecraft and m r james all published fiction that had it roots in the notion of the supernatural being linked to objects or places left behind all four writers are represented in this volume with powerful and hopefully unfamiliar examples of their work along with newer exponents of the craft such as ramsey campbell storm constantine christopher fowler alison littlewood kim newman reggie oliver and many others illustrated with the atmospheric photography of michael marshall smith the stories in the mammoth book of folk horror tap into an aspect of folkloric tradition that has long been dormant but never quite forgotten while the depiction of these forces as being in some way natural in no way detracts from the sense of nameless dread and escalating horror that they inspire

this study analyzes the relationship between race and genre in four of toni morrison s novels the bluest eye tar baby jazz and beloved heinert argues how morrison s novels revise conventional generic forms such as bildungsroman folktales slave narratives and the formal realism of the novel itself this study goes beyond formalist analyses to show how these revisions expose the relationship between race conventional generic forms and the dominant culture morrison s revisions critique the conventional roles of african americans as subjects of and in the genre of the novel and re write roles which instead privilege their subjectivity this study provides readers with new ways of understanding morrison s novels whereas critics often fault morrison for breaking with traditional forms and resisting resolution in her novels this analysis show how morrison s revisions shift the narrative truth of the novel from its representation in conventional forms to its interpretation by the readers who are responsible for constructing their own resolution or version of narrative truth these revisions expose how the dominant culture has privileged specific forms of narration in turn these forms privilege the values of the dominant culture morrison s novels attempt to undermine this privilege and rewrite the canon of american literature

howard w odum 1884 1954 the pioneering social scientist and founder of the university of north carolina's department of sociology played a leading and well documented role in the modernization of the south this is the first book length study of odum's contributions to southern folklore which had important but largely unappreciated consequences for his legacy of social justice lynn moss sanders shows how odum as a collector of african american blues and work songs anticipated some important precepts of modern folklore notably odum perceived the benefits of a collaborative and nonhierarchical approach to folk studies influenced by a racially tolerant former student and by one of his black folk informants odum changed his previous paternal segregationist attitudes about race comparing odum s two song collections the negro and his songs 1925 and negro workaday songs 1926 sanders links the growing influence of odum's coauthor and former student guy johnson to a decrease in instances of racial condescension between the first and second book the three folk novels in odum's black ulysses

trilogy completed in 1931 also reveal a progressive refinement of odum s racial views the change sanders believes came with odum s growing ability to see john wesley left wing gordon the black working class model for the trilogy s hero as a friend rather than simply as a representative of the negro from his authorship of social and mental traits of the negro 1910 now a relic of scientific racism to his final publication agenda for integration odum exemplifies how the study of folklore changed the folklorist a change felt by a whole generation of southern liberals whose work odum encouraged and shaped
