exploiting the expressive possibilities of print from spacing and indentation to alignment and typeface is one of the defining ways in which poetry was modernized in the twentieth century this book explores why british and american poets choose to experiment with the design and lay out of the printed page

how to read a poem is an introduction to creative reading the art of coming up with something to say about a text it presents a new method for learning and teaching the skills of poetic interpretation providing its readers with practical steps they can use to construct perceptive inventive readings of any poem they might read the introduction sets out the aims of the book and provides some basic operating principles for applying the seven steps in each subsequent chapter the step is introduced and explained relevant points of interpretative theory and methodology are discussed and illustrated with multiple examples and the step is put into practice in a final section through these final sections step by step the book develops an extended reading of a single poem letitia landon s lines written under a picture of a girl burning a love letter from 1822 that reading is sustained across the whole arc of the book providing a detailed worked example of how to read a poem this accessible and enjoyable guide is the ideal introduction to anyone approaching the detailed study of poetry for the first time and offers valuable theoretical insights for those more experienced in the area

this text discusses the visual and graphic conventions in contemporary poetry in english it defines contemporary poetry and its historical construction as a seen object and uses literary and social theory of the 1990s to facilitate the study in examining how a poem is recognized the interpretive conventions for reading it and how the spacial arrangement on the page is meaningful for contemporary poetry the text takes examples from individual poems there is also a focus on changes in manuscript conventions from old to middle english poetry and the change from a social to a personal understanding of poetic meaning from the late 18th through the 19th century

this handbook of poetic forms aims to offer historically informed approaches to a wide variety of poetic forms a particular emphasis will be on considering poetic form in dialogue with the cultural context in which it is being used as well as within the literary tradition of each form and to explore the stable as well as the historically variable affordances of each form in such contexts hereby the focus lies on prescriptive forms that is on poetic forms which are defined by or at least associated with specific metrical stanzaic or overall structures or the absence of such rather than poetic genres that are primarily characterised by similarities in subject matter like the elegy or the ode while this handbook should be accessible to students its aim is not to offer basic introductions but rather to broaden a historical and functional understanding of the poetic forms it covers and to engage with poetic forms not as givens but as historically contingent processes of formation above all this handbook s formalism is new formalist in emphasising historical awareness and contextualisation

this book uses textual and material evidence in poetry prayers physiologies sermons church buildings and monuments manuscript diaries and notebooks to explore how material things held spiritual meaning in george herbert s poetry and to reflect on scholarly approaches to matter and form in devotional poetry
