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in a moment of intense uncertainty surrounding the means ends and limits of countering terrorism this study approaches the recent theatres of war through theatrical stagings of terror theatre on terror subject positions in british drama charts the terrain of contemporary subjectivities both at home and on the front line beyond examining the construction and contestation of subject positions in domestic and sub urban settings the book follows border crossing figures to the shifting battlefields in iraq and afghanistan what emerges through the analysis of twenty one plays is not a dichotomy but a dialectics of home and front where fluid uncontainable subjects are constantly pushing the contours of conflict revising the critical consensus that post 9 11 drama primarily engages with the real ariane de waal argues that these plays navigate the complexities of the discourse rather than the historical or social realities of war and terrorism british theatre on terror negotiates inflects and participates in the discursive circulation of stories idioms controversies testimonies and pieces of mis information in the face of global insecurities

using psychological theory and the author's direct experience working with at risk youth this book answers the questions on the minds of anyone shocked and appalled by the events of the boston marathon bombings the shock of the 2013 boston marathon bombings was soon followed by a revelation initially disturbing and

mystifying two apparently unremarkable brothers one a teenager the other a young adult both well liked immigrants and longtime us residents had allegedly triggered the bombs why were these two seemingly normal individuals driven to commit such acts of coldblooded violence this book examines not only the lives motivations and key influences of these infamous brothers but those of other young unexpected terrorists worldwide comparing factors that contributed to their decisions to become terrorists and identifying methods used to recruit them into that deadly fold the chapters teach readers warning signs that youths are being drawn in to terrorism and serve to spur meaningful conversations among citizens politicians and policymakers about what we can do to prevent such recruitment of youths and young adults including other us residents who might consider emulating the tsarnaev brothers the book also addresses larger related questions such as whether humans are naturally violent who benefits when young individuals engage in terrorism and why minors are recruited to become killers

this book offers an extended analysis of writers and theatre companies in britain since 1995 and explores them alongside recent cultural social and political developments referencing well known practitioners from modern theatre this book is an excelle

documentary and verbatim theatre surveys the emergence and rise of work based on real life in contemporary theatre exploring the artists methodologies plays and central themes that have characterised its enduring popularity after charting the recent history of modern documentary theatre in the twentieth century and the debates that have surrounded it in the past thirty years each chapter examines in depth key practices such as headphone verbatim and extreme verbatim and practitioners from anna deavere smith

and david hare to the civilians and dv8 physical theatre practitioners chosen topics playwriting process and engagement with sometimes fraught debates in the field are brought to the fore focusing on the various dramaturgical and theatrical strategies used to create and stage documentary theatre this book provides a practice centric understanding of some of the principal issues related to the form including the tensions between fidelity to the documentary or verbatim record and the exercise of artistic licence the ethical issues entailed in representing living people the implications for actors and our understanding of acting and our assumptions about aesthetic distancing this is an essential introduction to documentary and verbatim theatre for theatre studies students teachers and scholars as well as theatre practitioners

focusing on major and emerging playwrights institutions and various theatre practices this concise companion examines the key issues in british and irish theatre since 1979 written by leading international scholars in the field this collection offers new ways of thinking about the social political and cultural contexts within which specific aspects of british and irish theatre have emerged and explores the relationship between these contexts and the works produced it investigates why particular issues and practices have emerged as significant in the theatre of this period

contemporary asylum narratives marks a transition from traditional modes of diasporic belonging to the need for identifications that encompass the statelessness of refugees and asylum seekers this book explores representations of asylum seekers and refugees in twenty first century literature film and theatre

verbatim theatre a type of performance based on actual words spoken by real people has been at the heart of a remarkable and unexpected renaissance of the genre in great britain since the mid nineties the central aim of the book is to critically explore and account for the relationship between contemporary british verbatim theatre and realism whilst questioning the much debated mediation of the real in theses theatre practices

a ruthless latin love lothario has set his sights on the women of london no gal is safe from the swarthy continental s seductions as he cha cha chas his way in to the boudoirs and jewellry boxes of belgravia thank heavens that square jawed hero dick barton is on hand to save the dignity and diamonds of our dowagers and debutantes or will the foreign fiend defeat him

the conviction that the development and promotion of the arts humanities and culture through the study of literature and the aesthetic are the fundamental constituents of any progress in society is at the heart of this volume the essays gathered here explore the role of the imagination and aesthetic awareness in an age when the corporatization of knowledge is in the process of transforming literary studies and political commitment is in danger of disappearing behind a supposedly post ideological late capitalist consensus the main focus of the volume is the mutual implication of aesthetics and ideology and the status and value of different types of art within the political arena challenging issues in contemporary aesthetics are examined within the wider framework of current debates on the disappearance of the real the crisis in representation and the use of new media the wide range of examples collected here stretching from experimental poetry in post war germany political commitment in twentieth century french theatre and countercultural rumanian theatre under ceauşescu to neo victorian fiction verbatim theatre in the uk and political theatre for the masses in estonia vouchsafe unique insights into the intersection of aesthetics and ideology and the practical consequences thereof as such the volume opens up a space for a meaningful engagement with authentic forms of art from

inside and outside the anglosphere and ultimately uses these examples as a platform from which to imagine some form of aesthethics representing an ideal union of aesthetics and ideology this concept first coined by the french philosopher philippe lacoue labarthe will prove to be relevant both within the parameters of the examples discussed here but also beyond for the contributors to this volume are unanimous in refusing to believe that aesthetics and ideology can exist one without the other and in recognizing the centrality of ethics in any discussion of these notions

authenticity is one of the major values of our time it is visible everywhere from clothing to food to self help books while it is such a prevalent phenomenon it is also very evasive this study analyses the culture of authenticity as it relates to theatre and establishes a theoretical framework for analysis daniel schulz argues that authenticity is sought out and marked by the individual and springs from a culture that is perceived as inherently fake and lacking depth the study examines three types of performances that exemplify this structure of feeling intimate theatre seen in forced entertainment productions such as quizoola 1996 2015 as well as one on one performances such as oentroerend goed s internal 2009 immersive theatres as illustrated by punchdrunk s shows the masque of the red death 2007 and the drowned man 2013 which provide a visceral sensate understanding for audiences finally the study scrutinises the popular category of documentary theatre through various examples such as robin soan s talking to terrorists 2005 david hare s stuff happens 2004 edmund burke s black watch 2007 and dennis kelly s pseudo documentary play taking care of baby 2007 it is specifically the value of the document that lends such performances their truth value and consequently their authenticity the study analyses how the success of these disparate categories of performance can be explained through a common concern with notions of truth and authenticity it argues

that this hunger for authentic unmediated experience is characteristic of a structure of feeling that has superseded postmodernism and that actively seeks to resignify artistic and cultural practices of the everyday

academic studies of terrorism grew exponentially in number after the september 11 attacks the problem was that much of this work of orthodox terrorism studies was biased often shoddily researched and was too closely identified with the power centres of western states its denizens were often former and sometimes current officials or officers in the military intelligence services or the security industry or were funded by them in response the project of critical terrorism studies was intended to give a more rounded account of political violence in the world it focuses on neglected issues like state terrorism western counterinsurgency propaganda and misinformation more than a decade since the founding of the critical project this book asks what has been learned it showcases leading examples of critical terrorism studies and presents an agenda for the expansion of an evidence based approach to political violence and terrorism with chapters by leading authorities such as joseba zulaika michael stohl mary hickman and richard jackson the book evaluates how far the critical project has come and where it is going next this book was published as a special issue of critical studies on terrorism

why do so many writers and audiences turn to theatre to resolve overwhelming topics of pain and suffering this collection of essays from international scholars reconsiders how theatre has played a crucial part in encompassing and preserving significant human experiences plays about global issues including terrorism and war are increasing in attention from playwrights scholars critics and audiences in this contemporary collection a gathering of diverse contributors explain theatre s special ability to generate dialogue and

promote healing when dealing with human tragedy this collection discusses over 30 international plays and case studies from different time periods all set in a backdrop of war the four sections document british and american perspectives on theatres of war global perspectives on theatres of war perspectives on black watch and finally perspectives on the great game afghanistan through this a range of international scholars from different disciplines imaginatively rethink theatre s unique ability to mediate the impacts and experiences of war featuring contributions from a variety of perspectives this book provides a wealth of revealing insights into why authors and audiences have always turned to the unique medium of theatre to make sense of war

from the fourteenth to the eighteenth centuries the armies of the ottoman empire brought terror in the name of islam to much of the christian world intermittently but relentlessly the sultans forces raided then conquered the danube valley as far as budapest and beyond their inexorable progress westward eventually brought them into conflict with the dynastic confederation created in central and eastern europe by the austrian habsburgs repeatedly faced with virtual annihilation by superior muslim forces the ruling powers in vienna fought to mobilise the minds as well as the military resources of their subjects in order to save both their faith and their soil the propaganda developed by both government and church particularly the roman catholic variant created then reinforced many of the negative stereotypes of muslims that are still familiar to europeans today gradually after the middle of the seventeenth century habsburg rulers and officials came to see that its political and military survival required solid information about the muslim foe that prejudiced ideas did not supply in terror and toleration paula sutter fichtner traces the story of this change of heart and mind in government and intellectual circles throughout the habsburg empire this episode shows she argues that it is possible to form and disseminate negative views of an enemy for political and strategic reasons yet

be able to reconfigure those views as circumstance and necessity dictates a highly original account of a fascinating historical and cultural encounter this book gives readers a close view of how a western empire not only survived islamic aggression but in the process learned how to consider and even work with muslims positively and productively publisher s website

i looked around the room and i thought i m the only person in this room that hasn t killed anyone talking to terrorists is a play commissioned by the royal court and out of joint the writer director max stafford clark and actors interviewed people from around the world who have been involved in terrorism they wanted to know what makes ordinary people do extreme things as well as those who crossed the line they met peacemakers warriors journalists hostages and psychologists their stories take us from uganda israel turkey iraq and ireland to the heart of the british establishment talking to terrorists was produced out of joint theatre company at the royal court theatre and on a uk tour in 2005

through interviews with leading writers including ahdaf soueif and hanif kureishi this book analyzes the writing and opinions of novelists of muslim heritage based in the uk discussion centres on writers work literary techniques and influences and on their views of such issues as the hijab the war on terror and the rushdie affair

this book is the sequel to britain through muslim eyes and examines contemporary novelistic representations of and by muslims in britain it builds on studies of the five senses and sensuous geographies of postcolonial britain and charts the development since 1988 of a fascinating and important body of fiction by muslim identified authors it is a selective literary history exploring case study novelistic representations of and by muslims in britain to allow in depth critical analysis through the lens of sensory criticism it argues that for authors of muslim heritage in britain writing the senses is often a double edged act of protest some of the key authors excoriate a suppression or cover up of non heteronormativity and women s rights that sometimes occurs in muslim communities yet their protest is especially directed at secular culture s ocularcentrism and at successive british governments efforts to surveil control and suppress muslim bodies

drone warfare represents one of the most pressing moral and political problems of contemporary military ethics since the beginning of the american drone program in the late twentieth century drone technologies have been used to conduct remote extrajudicial assassinations to violate national sovereignty and to conduct intrusive surveillance in contravention of international human rights norms among other controversial uses today military drones are used by dozens of military forces as such these technologies pose urgent questions which problematize well established ways of thinking about central aspects of the ethics of warfare such as justice sovereignty battlefield trauma the political and physical limits of conflict and perhaps most prominently of all the legitimacy of military violence though some of these concerns are well worn their central role in and reconfiguration by drone warfare means that they deserve serious reconsideration kill box investigates this urgent conceptual territory through readings of the popular cultural productions that have emerged as a part of these debates and reveals the ways in which narrative texts have been an integral part of the framing of these political and philosophical conversations examining well known single issue drone texts such as eye in the sky good kill and the drone eats with me alongside lesser known texts such as pulp novels genre sci fi and netflix thrillers this new book shows us the surprisingly versatile and elastic ways in which drone discourse continues to be co constituted by narrative entertainment

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
