the theatre of caryl churchill documents and analyses the major plays and productions of one of britain s greatest and most innovative playwrights drawing on hundreds of never before seen archival sources from the us and the uk it provides an essential guide to churchill s groundbreaking work for students and theatregoers each chapter illuminates connections across plays and explores major scripts alongside unpublished and unfinished projects each considers the rehearsal room the stage and the printed text each demonstrates how churchill has pushed the boundaries of dramatic aesthetics while posing urgent political and theoretical questions but since each maps churchill s work in a different way each deploys a different reading practice for many approaches are necessary to characterise such a restlessly imaginative and prolific career through its five interlocking parts the theatre of caryl churchill tells a story about the playwright her work and its place in contemporary drama

caryl churchill s plays are internationally performed studied and acclaimed by practitioners theatre scholars critics and audiences alike with fierce imagination the plays dramatise the anxieties and terrors of contemporary life this companion presents new scholarship on churchill s extraordinary and ground breaking work chapters explore a cluster of major plays in relation to pressing social topics ecological crisis sexual politics revolution terror and selfhood providing close readings of texts in their theatrical theoretical and historical contexts these topic based essays are intercalated with other essays that delve into churchill s major collaborations her performance innovations and her influences on a new generation of playwrights contributors explore churchill s career long experimentation her risk taking that has reinvigorated the stage both formally and politically providing a new critical platform for the study of a theatrical career that spans almost fifty years the companion pays fresh attention to churchill s poetic precision dark wit and inexhaustible creativity

in traps a set of characters meet themselves and their pasts to create plenty of sinewy lines and joyous juxtapostions plays and players vinegar tom is set in the world of seventeenth century witchcraft but it speaks through its striking images and its plethora of ironic contradictions of and to this century tribune light shining in buckinghamshire is set during the civil war and unflinchingly shows the intolerance that was the obverse side of the demand for common justice deftly it sketches in the kind of social conditions that led to hunger for revolution the play has an austere eloquence that precisely matches its subject the guardian cloud nine sheds light on some of the british empire s repressed dark side and is a marvelous play sometimes scurrilous always observed with wicked accuracy and ultimately surprisingly rather moving it plunges straight to

the heart of the endless convolutions of sexual mores and does so with acrobatic wit guardian owners i was in an old woman s flat when a young man offering her money to move came round that was one of the starting points of the play caryl churchill the plays in this volume represent the best of churchill s writing up to and including her emergence onto the international theatre scene with cloud nine

forms of emotion analyses how drama theatre and contemporary performance present emotion and its human and nonhuman diversity this book explores the emotions emotional feelings mood and affect which make up a spectrum of emotion to illuminate theatrical knowledge and practice and reflect the distinctions and debates in philosophy neuroscience psychology and other disciplines this study asserts that specific forms of emotion are intentionally unified in drama theatre and performance to convey meaning counteract separation and subversively champion emotional freedom the book progressively shows that the dramatic and theatrical representation of the nonhuman reveals how human dominance is offset by emotional connection with birds animals and the natural environment this book will be of great interest to students and researchers interested in the emotions and affect in dramatic literature theatre studies performance studies psychology and philosophy as well as artists working with emotionally expressive performance

although now celebrated as a world leading playwright caryl churchill has received little attention for her socialism which has been frequently overlooked in favour of emphasising gendered identities and postmodernist themes churchill s socialism examines eight of churchill s plays with reference to socialist theories and political movements this well researched and dynamic new book reframes churchill s work positioning her plays within socialist discourses and producing persuasive political readings of her drama that reflect much more of the political challenge that the plays pose it additionally explores her uneasy relationship with postmodernism which presents itself particularly in churchill's later plays the book contains a very helpful chapter on socialist contexts which outlines some of the key events debates and movements during the late 1960s up until the early 2000s this chapter also offers an incisive critique of the easy acceptance by some socialists of a postmodernist rejection of grand narratives and political agency an in depth examination of the rarely explored interconnections of utopianism and theatre forms another chapter where all eight of churchill s plays light shining in buckinghamshire vinegar tom top girls fen serious money mad forest the skriker and far away are introduced the plays are then discussed in pairs in a further four chapters with reference to communist historiography the class gender intersection the end of history thesis ecocritical challenges and postmodernism

theatre has come back to text but with perspectives shifted by the experimental practices of the twentieth century across performance forms contemporary playwriting brings its scenographic engagement to the foreground of the text reflecting the spatial turn in theory and practice in production this spatiality has renewed and enlivened the status and impact of text based theatre theatre studies needs to better describe the artfulness of contemporary text based theatre bringing to it the same sophisticated lenses scholars and critics have used for performance based theatre and other experimental theatre practices this element does that by presenting the work of caryl churchill naomi iizuka and sarah ruhl as exemplary of the way text based theatre both its scripts and productions now creates and expects a spatialized imaginary and demonstrates the potentials of text based theatre in an increasingly visual and spatial field of cultural production

in this volume lee brewer jones examines paula vogel as both a playwright and renowned teacher analyzing texts and early reviews of vogel s major plays including indecent desdemona how i learned to drive and the baltimore waltz before turning attention to her influence upon other major american playwrights including sarah ruhl lynn nottage and quiara alegría hudes chapters explore vogel s plays in chronological order consider her early influences and offer detailed accounts of her work in performance enriched by an interview with lynn nottage and essays from scholars ana fernández caparrós and amy muse this is a vibrant exploration of paula vogel as a major american playwright by the time paula vogel made her broadway debut with her 2017 rebecca taichman collaboration indecent she was already an accomplished playwright with a pulitzer prize for how i learned to drive 1998 and two obie awards she had also enjoyed a brilliant career as a professor at brown and yale with students such as sarah ruhl a macarthur genius grant winner pulitzer prize winners nilo cruz quiara alegría hudes and the only woman to win two pulitzers for drama lynn nottage vogel s theatre draws upon russian formalist viktor shklovsky and uses devices such as defamiliarization and negative empathy to challenge conventional definitions of protagonists and antagonists

this collection of essays covering a broad historical range shows that women working in theatre and drama since the time of aphra behn have been engaged in pushing the boundaries of conventional representation and dramaturgical convention collectively the authors show that women have used performing spaces as a channel for both political and personal radicalism one that has demanded and celebrated experimentalism as a kind of survival in a male dominated world

this exploration of the wide variety of censorship that has shaped theatrical performance in twentieth and twenty first century britain examines the unpredictable outcomes of censorship deep seated anxieties about the performative influence of the stage and the complex questions raised by acts of theatrical censorship

contemporary british theatre surveys the complex and dynamic theatre of the eighties and early nineties reflecting a country that is multicultural multiethnic and multinational the contributors artists scholars and critics offer insights into the unique forms of theatre performance devised to express the tensions and pressures of our time for the paperback edition a new preface has been written including several updating pieces from individual contributors

something exciting is happening with the contemporary history play new writing by playwrights such as jackie sibblies drury samuel adamson hannah khalil cordelia lynn and lucy kirkwood makes powerful theatrical use of the past but does not fit into critics familiar categories of historical drama in this book benjamin poore provides readers with tools to name and critically analyse these changes the contemporary history play contends that many history plays are becoming more complex and layered in their aesthetic approaches as playwrights work through the experience of being surrounded by numerous and varied forms of historical representation in the twenty first century for theatre scholars this book offers a means of interpreting how new writing relies on the past and notions of historicity to generate meaning and resonance in the present for playwrights and students of playwriting the book is a guide to the history play s recent past and to the state of the art what techniques and formulas have been popular the
