trauma and the mediated self contemporary life writing across media examines twenty first century representations of trauma in life writing across several media including printed word memoir graphic memoir autodocumentary and autobiographical video games through careful analysis loredana bercuci uncovers the medium specific demands for the representation of trauma in life writing in the context of the contemporary memoir boom she broadly argues that for a trauma representation to be considered successful each medium adapts its own means to adhere to a certain definition of trauma and in this manner a particular piece of life writing is accepted as a successful and reliable representation of trauma the representation of trauma in these autobiographical media has created a new trauma aesthetics that is defined by a cautious re engagement with the real

the gothic and twenty first century american popular culture examines the gothic mode deployed in a variety of texts that touch upon inherently us american themes demonstrating its versatility and ubiquity across genres and popular media the volume is divided into four main thematic sections spanning representations related to ethnic minorities bodily monstrosity environmental anxieties and haunted technology the chapters explore both overtly gothic texts and pop culture artifacts that despite not being widely considered strictly so rely on gothic strategies and narrative devices

we have been waiting for a book on war and memory about the american war in vietnam both about the americans and the vietnamese in the new century of the desert wars of afghanistan and iraq susan lyn eastman has fulfilled that expectation and she has done so

with a study impressive in its range of topical issues texts and commentary philip d beidler margaret and william going professor of english university of alabama after more than four decades the viet nam war continues to haunt our national memory culture politics and military actions in this probing interdisciplinary study susan lyn eastman examines a range of cultural productions from memorials and poetry to cinematic and fictional narratives that have tried to grapple with the psychic afterlife of traumatic violence resulting from the ill fated conflict in southeast asia underpinning the book is the notion of prosthetic memory which involves memories acquired by those with no direct experience of the war such as readers and filmgoers prosthetic memories eastman argues refuse to relegate the war to the forgotten past and challenge the authenticity of experience thus ensuring its continued relevance to debates over america s self conception specifically her coinage of the new vietnam syndrome and the country s role in world affairs when it comes to contemporary military interventions with the notable exception of the veterans memorial in washington eastman s focus is on works produced from the persian gulf war 1990 91 through the post 9 11 war on terror she looks not only at american representations of the war from movies like randall wallace s we were soldiers to poems by w d ehrhart yusef komunyakaa and others but also at novels by vietnamese authors bao ninh and huong thu duong the experiences of women figure prominently in the book eastman devotes a chapter to the vietnam women s memorial and another to sandie frazier s novel i married vietnam and oliver stone s film heaven and earth based on memoirs by le ly hayslip and by examining jessica hagedorn s dream jungle a novel inspired by the filming of apocalypse now she considers how the war s repercussions were felt in other countries in this case the philippines her investigation of vietnamese american authors lan cao andrew lam and gb tran adds a transnational dimension to the study susan lyn eastman teaches in the department of english at the university of tennessee at chattanooga

this book examines how asian american authors since 1945 have deployed the stereotype of asian american inscrutability in order to re examine and debunk the stereotype in various ways by paying special attention to what narrative theorists have regarded as one of the most extraordinary aspects of fiction its ability to give or else deny readers a remarkably detailed knowledge of the inner lives of their characters this book explores deeply and systematically the specific ways asian american narratives attribute inscrutable minds to asian american characters situating them at various points along a spectrum stretching between alterity and empathy ultimately the book reveals the link between narrative form and larger cultural issues associated with the representation of asian american minds and how a nuanced investigation of narrative form can yield insights into the sociocultural embeddedness of asian american literature under the case studies insights that would not be available if such formal questions were by passed
