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this book presents the formerly unpublished manuscript by wheeler and cline detailing the

landmark comparative prisons study they conducted in the 1960s which examined fifteen scandinavian prisons and nearly 2000 inmates across four nordic countries at the time it was the largest comparative study of prisons and inmate behavior ever undertaken and despite 15 years of analysis and write up it was never published but it influenced many other important prison studies that followed this book engages with the functionalist perspectives that were widespread in the 1960s and tries to answer some of the classical questions of prison sociology such as how prisoners adapt to imprisonment and the degree to which prisoner adaptations can be attributed to characteristics of prisoners and prisons it examines the nature and structure of prisons the effect of that structure on individual prisoners and the other factors that may influence the way that they respond to confinement it also includes discussion about the prisoners considerations of justice and fairness and a explanation of the study design and data which was highly unique at the time the scandinavian prison study brings wheeler and cline s pioneering work into the present context with a preface and an introduction which discuss the questions and claims raised in the book still relevant to this day

this book uses the contrast between the theoretical positions of the two max webers that is the weber of the protestant ethic thesis and the weber of the theory of action as the basis for developing a theory of agency and an associated dynamic interpretive approach to action the book critiques traditional theories of action for neglecting the physical dimension for conflating agency with action and contrasting the latter with behaviour it argues that action is not just cerebral or communicative but inherently tied to effort emotion and imagination with voluntarism understood in terms of attention instead of intention and the exercise of will rather than choice this is the basis of a dynamic interpretivist approach one that integrates behavioural insights with interpretive sociology highlighting how actors actively maintain their power of agency the concept of character is also introduced as a crucial link between individual agency ethical values and cultural systems this book will be of interest to researchers and students of sociology anthropology media studies and criminology as well as social theorists

the aim of the handbook of sociology of education is to present the most theoretically grounded and empirically rigorous sociological analyses of schools to date the authors are distinguished researchers in the field their contributions to the handbook offer major theoretical perspec tives on the schooling process and describe significant empirical studies of schools and their effects on individuals and society the research presented in the handbook is built on three fundamental tenets of sociol ogy first the authors adopt the perspective that schools are a central institution in society an understanding of the function

of schooling in social life is enhanced by viewing schools as interrelated with other societal institutions the study of how the context of schooling influ ences education processes is critical to an understanding of school outcomes rather than being determined solely by ascribed and achieved characteristics an individual s cognitive and social development are influenced heavily by the structures and networks in which the individual is embedded communities families schools and social groups are critical ele ments in the educative process by viewing the school as a societal institution and highlighting the interaction between context and individual behavior the handbook chapters provide a broader and deeper understanding of the determinants of learning in contemporary society the second sociological insight that guides the research in the handbook is that the school is a social system

geisler argues that the over reliance on co variation techniques and statistical methods instead of process approach and in depth analysis produces meaningless knowledge in the managerial and organizational sciences and indeed throughout all the social sciences he offers instead a new and different approach based on the notion of what he calls dynamic morphologies an architecture of slicing complex phenomena this way it is possible to explain many inconsistencies in research findings and to find a cohesive systematic outlook on research research design and knowledge creation intellectually challenging and following in the footsteps of kuhn argyris and popper geisler s approach is frankly revolutionary in research design and contains its own notions terms and nomenclature a provocative discussion for academics and others well trained in the organizational managerial and social sciences geisler s dynamic morphologies provide a means to research complex phenomena and gain knowledge about them they are composed of a chain of events combined logically and temporally and a method by which this process is studied geisler also contends that knowledge in the organizational and managerial sciences is only viable when it describes and explains the complex higher order phenomena therefore theory building and research in these fields must be linked to higher order constructs and the phenomena that they attempt to explain this is the central notion of amplitude that geisler introduces and describes his book also criticizes the evolutionary epistemology view of knowledge creation and contends that knowledge in all of these fields of study in general is not evolutionary but instead cumulative and expansive

in the field by renee c fox is a narrative account of the author s life as a sociologist it is not a memoir in the conventional sense rather it is an ethnographic autobiography drawing on a vast reservoir of notes and documents that chronicle the span of her career this work also focuses on the places fox s field research has carried her propelled by a conviction to move beyond the boundaries of herself and of her native land fox has done first hand research in europe central africa and china as well as in the united states the majority of her research has centered on health illness and medicine other recurrent themes that pervade her work include training for uncertainty the allocation of scarce resources the relationship between self and others detachment and concern the particular and the universal the harm that can result from intended good and the questions posed by illness and accident pain and suffering and death it is fox s commitment as a teacher and mentor of generations of students that lies at the heart of this book this volume will inspire new generations of social researchers

first published in 1998 this is volume xi of twenty two in a series on social theory and methodology notions are widespread that sociological theory is either an industrious activity on the drawing boards of the architects of fantasy or a branch of esoterics operating in a shadowy realm of semi darkness the present study holds neither of these conceptions of sociological the present study s function is to illuminate the difference between one theory and another the power and reliability of a theory are not always evident all at once a theory may have a power to explain what was not originally anticipated it may also disclose the existence of problems it cannot explain

appropriate as a supplemental text to courses in sociology providing an overview grounded in research developments in sociology focuses on the major areas of theoretical methodological and substantive developments in sociology each author takes a field of study in which they are an acknowledged expert and highlights the way in which the subject has developed over the last fifty years

conventional institutional approach to sociology and avoids he artificial fragmentation of major theories and concepts in common to so many introductory texts from this text the student is able to develop a clear understanding of what makes sociology a distinct and rigorous discipline a discipline which has evolved historically through the analysis of certain fundamental issues many of which continue to have a contemporary relevance and while introducing the student to classical theory the authors also show how these theories illuminate present social problems

continuing in a path worked on by horowitz in the 1950s in the idea of war and peace in contemporary social and philosophical thought expanded upon in the 1970s with foundations of political sociology this summing up in the late 1990s is an effort to extract and evolve the canon of political sociology the result is a reevaluation of the intellectual sources of the present day divisions between statists and socialists welfarists and individualists advocates of dictatorship and democracy mandated rules and voluntary association hard realists and soft utopians advocates of a world without states and those desiring a world with a single state horowitz does not offer the usual evolutionary notion of doctrines but a canon embedded within the societies they aimed to serve or overthrow in the present as in the past the result is a major recasting of the theory and practice of social science and its normative frameworks

beyond empiricism expands the discourse on theories of criminal behavior it considers institutional social and individual issues related to criminal behavior while individually each raises questions about the adequacy of current theoretical claims the topics have significant implications both for policy and research in criminology per olof wikstrom introduces a cross level action theory of crime he suggests that better understanding of causal mechanisms can lead to a situational theory of action based on perception of alternatives and the process of choice david wolcott and steven schlossman provide new perspectives on the issues of racial disparity and the incarceration of adolescents in adult prisons these authors highlight gaps in our understanding of early twentieth century juvenile justice and negate some popular claims about recent changes in the criminal law peter grabosky spotlights privatization policies in the criminal justice system suggesting a framework for analyzing the balance of advantage resulting from three basic forms of institutional relationships in policing steven messner and richard rosenfeld discuss why institutional analysis has been seriously underdeveloped in etiological analyses of crime jordan pederson and matthew shane scrutinize the concept of aggression their descriptions of aggressive behavior among non human animals provide a fascinating backdrop for understanding human actions joan mccord emphasizes the intentionality of crimes as she argues that to

understand what causes crime one must have a theory about what it means to act intentionally after critically appraising prior theories mccord introduces and defends a new theory of motivation based on a post empiricist theory of language this latest volume in the distinguished advances in criminological theory series continues to add to the theoretical underpinnings of the field and will be important to all collections of social science research on criminology

our purpose in assembling the papers in this collection is to introduce readers to studies of normal and abnormal behavior in chinese culture we want to offer a sense o what psychiatrists and social scientists are doing to advance our under standing of this subject including what fmdings are being made what questions researched what conundrums worried over since our fund of knowledge is obviously incomplete we want our readers to be aware of the limits to what we know and to our acquisition of new knowledge although the subject is too vast and uncharted to support a comprehensive synthesis in a few areas e g psychiatric epidemiology enough is known for us to be able to present major reviews the chapters themselves cover a variety of themes that we regard as both intrinsically interesting and deserving of more systematic evaluation many of the issues they address we believe to be valid concerns for comparative cross cultural studies no attempt is made to artificially integrate these chapters since the editors wish to highlight their distinctive interpretive frameworks as evidence of the rich variety of approaches that scholars take to this subject we see this volume as a modest and self consciously limited exploration here are some accounts and interpretations but by no means all of normal and ab normal behavior in the context of chinese culture that we believe fashion a more discriminating understanding of at least a few important aspects of that subject

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
